A young choirboy was intrigued with what was going on at church which was most unusual, not like an ordinary Sunday!

Here comes an outdoor procession with a man riding on a donkey with people from the congregation waving branches from the trees. When he looked closely he had a shock—the man on the donkey was his school headmaster! Then they all went into church - donkey and all!

What am I praying for this month? By Revd. Mark.

Something that has felt in short supply recently is hope. If we understand hope as simply responding to the world with a sunny personality then it is not surprising that such a hope is



hard to muster given the many challenges facing the world. But that is not the kind of hope we know at Easter. The Jews of Jesus' time understood that God resided in the Holy of Holies, an area separated from the rest of the Temple - and all humanity - by a huge curtain. On Good Friday, at the moment Jesus died that curtain was torn. Death, that great divide between humanity and our creating, life-giving God was torn. That great moment of hope begins at the hardest and saddest moment in all of history. This is the kind of hope that comes from outside ourselves, that is the gift of Easter and it is hope in the face of death. It is the tenacious and radical hope that comes with the forgiveness and new life of Easter. My prayer for the world is that the world will be made new in this kind of hope, the hope that never leaves us and is always true.

This is the time of year when our gardens come to life again. Gardens and lawns are precious to many and efforts to replace lawns with wildflowers can be contentious. That is why I like the 'no-mow May' initiative.



There is no need to lose your lawn altogether but simply leave it alone in May to encourage bees, butterflies and wildflowers in this key window of time.

"Lights in their Own Generation"

A series celebrating, month by month, some of those who left a special mark on the history of the worldwide Christian Church. "Lights" that shine in April by Fr. lan Robb



9th: Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Lutheran Pastor. Opposed to Nazism, he was banned from teaching, continually harassed by Hitler's regime, before being interned in Flossenburg concentration camp where he was murdered on this day in 1945.

19th: Alphege, Archbishop of Canterbury. Monk at Deerhurst (Gloucestershire), Abbot of Bath, Bishop of Winchester, Archbishop of Canterbury. Murdered at Greenwich, 1012.

21st: Anselm, Archbishop of Canterbury. Teacher, abbot, archbishop, died in 1109.

23rd: George, Patron of England. Soldier in Palestine, martyred for his faith in 304. After the Crusades he was made Patron of England.

25th: Mark the Evangelist. John Mark, travelling companion of Paul &Barnabas, later imprisoned in Rome with Peter & Paul. Leaders of the Early Church state that "Mark was the interpreter of Peter, and that which Peter remembered was recorded by Mark" - and so the first of the four New Testament gospels came into being. It is highly likely that Mark was executed after Peter and Paul on the orders of the Emperor Nero, which would make the date his gospel 64-65AD.

27th: Christina Rossetti, poet. Associated with the Pre-Raphaelite movement but famous for her poetry on religious subjects. "In the bleak midwinter" is among her work. Died on this day in 1894.

29th: Catherine of Siena, teacher of the faith. A Dominican nun, nourished by a life of contemplative prayer and mystical experiences. An adviser on political and religious matters and an ambassador to the pope in Avignon. She produced copious writings on the religious life as well as numerous letters of counsel and advice. She died in 1380.

If family and friends are coming round for Easter why not treat them to Tricia's luscious Beetroot & Chocolate cake? It's very moreish so don't be surprised if it soon goes!



Ingredients

100g butter
75g chocolate chips
185g caster sugar
2 eggs
175g s r flour
4g baking powder
175g fresh cooked beetroot
85g full fat soft cheese
50g icing sugar

Method

Preheat oven to 180c or 160c fan. Grease and line a 2lb loaf tin. Melt chocolate chips in a bowl over simmering water then place to one side. Beat butter until soft and creamy. Beat caster sugar into the mixture until pale and fluffy. Beat in the eggs a little at a time and then fold in the melted chocolate. Stir in the flour and baking powder and fold in the grated cooked beetroot.

Place mixture in the tin and level the top, Bake from 45 minutes to 1 hour, until firm and risen .Cool in tin for 15 minutes before transferring to a wire rack to cool completely.

Frosting Beat the soft cream cheese, stir in the sieved icing sugar and beat together. spread on the cold cake.

Enjoy!


