Each part has a distinctive part to play and so I shall try to say something about that part of the story and pose a question for you and a simple prayer.

BUT -AND HERE IS WHAT WE AS CHRISTIANS NEED TO REMEMBER - ARE WE PUTTING CHRIST INTO CHRISTMAS?

What do I mean by that Question?

I am sure you will agree that this is also a holy time; for many going to worship in our local church; but also to see if there is any way in which we can help someone worse off than ourselves to be able to enjoy something of this Holy time - things which we often take for granted.

SO A PRAYER.

We thank you good Lord for bringing us safely to this most holy time.

May it really be for us a Christ like time with all that goes with it, and make us mindful of all those who need help and comfort AMEN.







EPIPHANY A TIME FOR SHOWING.

Perhaps we can think what this strange word means for us. The word EPIPHANY means 'showing' - in this context it is the visit of the Three Wise men as they are often called, to witness this remarkable baby Jesus.

However the teaching of the story is clear - that a group of travellers went on this journey to see the child of which they had heard. So as they related the experience it is clear that in this way the Christ child was shown to the waiting world. How much the world needs this experience today - there is a longing for the Good News which this story portrays.



In this way then the teaching for us today is clearly of a search for good news and the Epiphany story is very much along those lines. By being a Christian you and I are on this search ourselves and this whole Christmas story is for so many people a turning point in their lives so it is a real sign of hope and promise.

Perhaps YOU can help someone along this journey?

SO OUR THIRD PRAYER:

Help us, good Lord on our search to find Jesus in our own lives!

And as we do this may it help us to help others as they go on their own search! AMEN.

POSTSCRIPT ON PRAYER - FATHER HUGH

I am most grateful to those readers who responded to my Editorial last month which was under the sub-heading 'Lord teach us to pray'. Here I was at pains to point out that like anyone else I did not find it easy to pray on many occasions, and the present sad tragedy in world affairs was a good example. Yes - but we do need to continue to seek to pray for this and so many issues which confront us personally and on all sides.

Regarding what I stated on this subject last month, here is an example of how we can be helped as we seek to pray.

On the subject of the Middle East situation I was given recently a copy of an address given which I feel fits how we can be helped to pray in all kinds of ways. Here is an extract from that speech.

'The overwhelming numbers of Jews and Muslims and the vast majority of Israelis and Palestinians have simple desires; they want to get up in the morning, share a breakfast with their family, send their children to school, welcome them home in the evening for supper and put them to bed. They want to repeat the following day and every day thereafter, and it ought not to be beyond the capacity of propaganda to ascertain and make known the truth; to denounce injustice, not only when it is committed against others; to defend human rights, not only ours but theirs; to insist that peace requires the way of moderation, compromise and reconciliation; and to build bridges of respect and understanding trust and friendship across the chasms that divide humanity. Israel and Palestine need our prayers and our efforts to fulfil the potential of its two peoples and the work starts now!'

So use this inspired piece of writing - read it with care, then read it again - and then pray its wealth of meaning!

Sometimes preparing for Christmas at church can feel like quite a burden but that is like any work I suppose. It is easy to forget why we do what we do and to enjoy it. In fact for most of the time planning Christmas events with a wide variety of folk in the congregation and community is a real joy. We work together rehearsing, thinking ahead and imagining the warmth, hope and joy of Christmas together for the common good of our community, looking forward in anticipation of celebrations together.



Whether it is working with the Love2Sing choir, Scouts, Guides, Brownies, Cubs, Beavers and Rainbows or our schools or community groups it is a time to draw on valued relationships

in our community. Perhaps my favourite is the list of community representatives that will come together to read for the service of lessons and carols, that great crescendo of readings and carols that both celebrate the Christmas story and remind us of the greatness of the story of God among us. A presence that we still feel in the love and faithfulness of those who serve our community throughout the year.

Creation Care

Perhaps some may want to call me a 'party pooper' for suggesting that we do our best to Care for Creation over Christmas but I think Caring for Creation is just what we are called to do in the Christmas story.

The Service of Lessons and carols that we will celebrate at St James' and that has been made famous by Kings College Cambridge was devised the Bishop of Truro, Bishop Edward White Benson in 1880. Bishop Benson wanted to draw on the whole bible to tell a story about the baby in the manger that was about the salvation of the whole Universe, never mind just planet Earth!



At Christmas time we remember that our God is so faithful to His Creation that his only son was born in Creations midst in a lowly stable, reminding us that God's Creation is good and made sacred by his presence and promise. If God has been so faithful to us, we must be faithful to His

Creation, which he has placed in our care. So yes, choose crackers and wrapping paper that can be easily recycled, don't waste too much food and perhaps even enjoy meeting together in one house so that you do not need to heat several.

Let us remember all that He has done for us at Christmas and, in our simple ways, promise to do our best for Him and His Creation from now on.

What I am praying about ...

One of the great promises many of us make at Christmas time happens because of the baby. I know many of the privileges of being a father and one of those is to know the period after a baby's birth of the very special peace and tranquillity of the 'babymoon'.

To those who have not experienced it, it is hard to describe. Perhaps it is like the opposite of what is said to happen at the end of our lives when 'all that we have done flashes before our eyes', perhaps the babymoon is when the endless possibilities of new life present themselves over a longer period of a few weeks.

Whatever it is, and despite the crying and sleepless nights, it is uniquely wonderful and it is a lot like the best feelings of Christmas time. A new baby can be a kind of covenant - a devoted promise - to the future. A new beginning, a new hope and a new peace. God knows - and we all know - that our planet needs that new beginning, that new peace.

My prayer is that it will come as we re-enact the coming of the Christ child and that we will make a new covenant with each other, a new devoted promise, to work together for peace. Dear God, may we know your peace once more. AMEN

Three Seasons in two months **Our Christian Calendar**



During December and January the worldwide Church celebrates three "Seasons" of the Christian Year: Advent, Christmas, & Epiphany.

Advent - the beginning of the Christian year; a season of expectation and preparation as we get ready to celebrate the coming (adventus) of Christ into our human race - we call this "Incarnation", becoming flesh. The season also looks ahead to Christ's final advent as judge at the end of time. The readings which we shall hear in church, or study at home, not only direct us towards Christ's birth, they also challenge the modern reluctance to face the theme of divine judgement: "Every eye shall now behold him, robed in dreadful majesty" (Charles Wesley). The four "Last Things" - Death, Judgement, Heaven, Hell - have been Advent themes for many centuries. The



characteristic notes of Advent are therefore expectation and penitence - not dissimilar to the season of Lent.

During Advent we shall hear of the important parts played in God's plan of salvation firstly by the Old Testament prophets especially Isaiah - to whom God revealed, some 600 years beforehand - that his Messiah would come to rescue and redeem a broken world. Although John the Baptist was a contemporary of Jesus - you can read about John's early years in St Luke chapter 1 – he was in fact the last of the Old Testament prophets and his message had a particular urgency: the Messiah is about to begin his work; get ready to receive him! The third Sunday in Advent -"Gaudete Sunday" – Rejoice! - gives honour to John the Baptist. The season comes to a climax with the call of God to the Blessed Virgin Mary, whom God has chosen to be the mother of His Son. Mary's response: "I am the Lord's servant; let it be to me as you have said" signifies her faith and her willingness to carry out this special, important task and enable the plan of salvation to unfold.

Christmas is much more than simply the celebration of Jesus' birth – you will hear that neither of the great Midnight readings, the letter to Hebrews and John's gospel chapter 1, come from the infancy narratives. The aim of our services at Midnight & Christmas morning is to recall us, amid all the joyful customs and celebrations, to the central truth of the Word made flesh for our salvation. Emanuel – God with us, a wonderful miracle, a joyous mystery.

It is, of course, the birth of Jesus the Christ that has provided the occasion for this festival of the incarnation, which the Church has observed since the end of the 3rd century. The Christmas crib and the nativity play can both be traced back to the tableau of Christ's birth that Francis of Assisi arranged when he celebrated Christmas in 1223. Christmas carols are a medieval tradition which has been expanded from the end of the 19th century. The service of Lessons & Carols is an English creation of the late 19th century, made widespread by the choir of King's College Cambridge in the early 20th century.

The days around 25th December are a principal holiday in the secular calendar of Britain, and commercial pressures have led to much of Christmas celebration being displaced in Advent. It has become a greater challenge to celebrate as they deserve to saints of the Christmas season: Stephen, the first Christian martyr; John, who was believed to have lived to a great age in meditation on the Word made flesh; and the Holy Innocents, who draw our attention to the plight of children in a world where the Christchild is ignored. The clear challenge to Christians is to make sure that the Christmas story is heard, and explained, at every opportunity - God with us.

Epiphany - A Greek word which means "Manifestation – a showing-forth". In the Western Church the 6th January was made an occasion to celebrate one element in the story of Christ's birth, the visit of the far-travelled Magi ("Astrologers from the East", Matthew chapter 2 v1-11), understood as the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles. Matthew does not give us a number: later tradition fixed their number at three and gave them names. It is Matthew's aim that the Good News of Jesus Christ is shared among all nations - and it is therefore apt that we pray for the worldwide mission of the Church in Epiphanytide. In the Eastern Churches the Epiphany is the celebration of Christ's baptism, when the voice from heaven proclaims him as God's beloved Son.

The season of joyful celebration that begins at Christmas will continue through the Sundays of Epiphany, featuring the call of the first disciples and the first miracle at the wedding at Cana, and the festal cycle ends with the Feast of the Presentation (Candlemas). The child who has been revealed to the shepherds at his birth, and to the Magi at the climax of their search, is recognised by Simeon and Anna when he comes to be presented in the Temple according to the Law of Israel: "Every first-born male shall be deemed to belong to the Lord" - he is a "Light to lighten the Gentiles" and "the glory of God's people Israel".

Thus the third season of the year comes to an end, but Simeon's final words move our attention away from the celebration of Christmas; the Christ-child has already begun to fulfil his Father's calling.

The Bible readings for Advent, Christmas, & Epiphany will of course be published in our weekly Newsheet. May God grant you excitement in your Advent preparation, joy in the good news of our Saviour's birth, and confirmation in your faith as you follow Him throughout the unfolding year.



Who was Mark? By Revd. Gordon Ripley

From Advent Sunday we start a new Church year. And, at the Eucharist, this coming year we'll be hearing principally from St Mark's Gospel. Which begs the question – who was Mark and what enabled him to write such a profound book?

The New Testament tells us a good deal about Mark. He was the son of a well-to-do lady of Jerusalem whose name was Mary, and whose house was a rallying-point and meeting place of the Early Church.

So, from the very beginning Mark was brought up in the very centre of the Christian fellowship. Mark was also the nephew of Barnabas, and when Paul and Barnabas set out on their first missionary journey they took Mark with them to be their secretary and attendant.

It was a most unfortunate journey for Mark. When they reached Perga Paul proposed to strike inland up to the central plateau of Asia Minor (modern Day Turkey); and for some reason Mark left the expedition and went home. We don't know the reason why. St John Crysostom thought it was because he missed his Mum! Paul simply called him a 'quitter'.

For some years Mark simply vanishes from history. Tradition says that he went to Egypt and founded the Church in Alexandria.

Yet, some twenty years later. When Paul was in prison, the one man Paul wanted with him, at the end, was Mark.

So, where did Mark get his information about the life and work of Jesus? Well, Mark's home was a Christian centre of Jerusalem. So, he must have heard people tell of their personal memories of Jesus.

But, towards the end of the second century there was a man called Papias who was an early Church historian and he tells us that Mark's gospel is actually a record of the preaching material of Peter.

Indeed, Mark was so close to Peter that Peter called him "Mark, my son." What we have In Mark's gospel is what Mark remembered of the preaching material of Peter himself.

The Gospel of Mark is a book of amazing importance. First, it is the earliest of all the gospels. It was written just shortly after Peter died and its date will be about A.D.65; and, second, it embodies nothing less than a record of what Peter preached and taught about Jesus.

We can look forward to spending the coming year with the earliest gospel and it's the gospel in which we hear again the preaching of Peter himself.

"On the first day of Christmas my true love gave to me a partridge in a pear tree" here true love refers to God, the two turtle doves refer to the Old and New Testaments and three French hens refers to the theological virtues of faith, hope and love.

The four calling birds refer to the four gospels and the five gold rings refer to the first five books of the Old Testament, the Pentateuch, which gives the history of man's fall from grace.

Six geese a-laying refers to the six days of creation, seven swans a-swimming to the seven sacraments, eight maids a-milking to the eight beatitudes, nine ladies dancing to the fruits of the Holy Spirit and 10 lords a-leaping is a reference to the 10 Commandments.

Eleven pipers a-piping refers to the 11 apostles and finally, the 12 drummers drumming refers to the 12 points of doctrine in the Apostle's Creed.

Lovell Cornwall standing next to the Spindle Tree


The Euonymus Alatus, or the Spindle Tree is thriving in Lovell and Rita Cornwall's garden. The tree is a fine specimen and we managed to take a photo of Lovell standing by it before Storm Ciaran wiped it clean of all its leaves.

Lovell says "There is actually three shrubs there, when I planted them 3 years ago, I knew they would do well as they were going in ground where I'd previously grown runner beans, so I knew there would be plenty of nitrogen in the soil.

An interesting development is that last year I pruned back the left hand one as it was growing into another shrub, Viburnum Plicatum, (Kilimanjaro), and although the pruned one is growing well, it has been shaded by the others, and it's leaves are still green. Clearly, the leaves need the sunlight to turn the lovely red colour.

I shall prune the other two shrubs during the winter."

We encourage as many people as possible to walk, we keep the prices down and it's run by volunteers.

We were overwhelmed by how many people bought tickets on the night, we strongly urge those

Festive Honey Cake



Our Tea@2 team are always trying out new and exciting recipes. They are all well received by our Tea@2 crowd. Many of our Tea@2 regulars ask for the recipe. Here is Pat's recipe for one of our firm favourites 'Honey Cake'

Tea@2 is held every Wednesday in the church from 2pm. From 13th December we are taking a break for Christmas and back on Wednesday 10th January 2024



3 eggs

200 grams sugar

125ml light vegetable oil

250 grams dark liquid honey

2 tablespoons rum or brandy

125ml warm strong black coffee

2 teaspoons baking powder

½ teaspoon baking soda

1 teaspoon cinnamon

Grated zest 1 orange

300 grams plain flour

- 1. Beat the eggs with the sugar until pale and creamy. Then beat in the oil, honey, brandy and coffee.
- 2. In a separate bowl mix the baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon, orange zest with the flour.
- 3. Add gradually to the egg and honey mixture, beating vigorously to a smooth batter.
- 4. Line a 24 cm tin and pour in the batter. Or divide between 2 24cmx13cm loaf tins.
- 5. Bake the large cake in a preheated over 350F/180c/gas4 for 1 hour and a ¼ or longer until firm and brown on top. And the smaller ones for 1 hour.
- 6. For information, I always make the 2 loaf tin cakes as they freeze very well. In my oven which is a bit on the hot side I bake them for 50 minutes. If you don't want to use brandy or rum, orange juice would also do very well. I check on the cakes after about 30 minutes and cover them with foil, very gently.
- 7. Serve it buttered as you would a tea bread



Book Review







"HAVE A LITTLE FAITH" - REVD KATE BOTTLEY
