<u>"Lights in their Own Generation"</u> A series celebrating, month by month, some of those who left a special mark on the history of the worldwide Christian Church. "Lights" that shine in March by Fr. lan Robb



1st: David, Patron of Wales. David was a monk and a bishop in the 6th century. He was reputed to be a perfect example of the ascetic, spiritual life and highly regarded for his kindness and compassion. He founded the monastery at Menevia, now St David's, and at least a dozen other monasteries. He based his rule of life on that of the Egyptian desert Fathers, with a strong emphasis on hard work, abstinence from alcohol, and a refraining from unnecessary speech. He has been honoured as Patron of Wales since the 12th century.

2nd: Chad, Bishop of Lichfield. Born in Northumbria, he was the youngest of four sons, who all became priests and monks. They were trained at Lindisfarne under the guardianship of St Aidan. Chad was appointed abbot of Lastingham before becoming Bishop of York. He was sent by his archbishop to take care of the huge diocese of Mercia, which covered most of the midlands, and he established his cathedral at Lichfield. He travelled extensively around his diocese before becoming a victim to the plague in 672.

7th: Perpetua, Felicity & their Companions. This group of Christian friends lived in Carthage, in what is now Libya, in the 3rd century. Perpetua was a noblewoman, Felicity her maid, Saturas was the local priest, and two other male companions. They were all part of the local congregation when they were arrested by the Roman authorities and dispatched to the public arena to be mauled by wild animals. They somehow survived and were sentenced to be executed and before the sentence was carried out, they :all made a public profession of their faith. Their story was widely circulated and the story of their martyrdom strengthened their fellow Christians in the face of adversity.

17th: Patrick, Patron of Ireland. Patrick was a Cornishman by birth, who had been taken to Ireland as a slave, aged sixteen. It seems that he escaped to the Continent, where his nominal Christian faith grew, and he was trained as a priest under the guidance of Martin of Tours. In his early forties he returned to Ireland as a bishop, making Armagh his headquarters. He faced some fierce opposition but continued to travel around the island, establishing a number of monastic communities. These foundations proved the be the basis for a system of dioceses linking the Church in Ireland.

19th: Joseph of Nazareth. Matthew's gospel describes Joseph as a good man, a working carpenter, who trusted in God. An angelic visitor shared God's will for him to be the husband of Mary, who was to be the mother of the Lord. Luke's gospel tells how Joseph thook the new-born child s if he were his own, presenting him to God on the fortieth day after his birth. The adoption of Jesus by Joseph also established Jesus as a descendent of David, in accordance with the prophecy of old.

20th: Cuthbert of Lindisfdarne. Born in the Scottish lowlands, Cuthbert was a shepherd, which occupation gave him ample time for prayer. Inspired by a vision, he asked to be admitted to the community at Melrose Abbey and it was from there that his missionary work eventually brought him to Lindisfarne, where he became abbot and, in 685, bishop. He continued to travel and teach across his diocese, returning regularly to Lindisfarne where he ended his days, in the company of a few of his monks.

25th: The Annunciation of our Lord to the Blessed Virgin Mary Luke's gospel tells how Mary of Nazareth was called by God to take a vital part in the plan of salvation. This day marks to conception of Christ in her womb and has been celebrated in the worldwide Church since the fourth century. It affirms the perfect humanity and the complete divinity of Jesus and acknowledges Mary as Theotokos – God-bearer, which in Western Christendom became translated as Mother of God.

26th: Harriet Monsell of Clewer Harriet was born in 1811, of Irish parentage. Her husband was a clergyman and after his death she went to work in a penitentiary at Clewer near Windsor. She was professed as a Religious in1852, eventually becoming the first Superior of the Community.

We are pleased to announce that following a very successful recruitment campaign, we now have 3 new councillors who recently joined the council and who bring with them a wealth of experience and enthusiasm. We very much welcome them onboard and their details will be added to our Website very shortly so that you can read a little bit about them, what they have to offer to the role and why they have chosen to become a Town Councillor. This means that we are nearly running with a full compliment which enables councillors to take on more tasks and achieve more in the process. We have one vacancy so please do contact us if you are interested in becoming a Town Councillor.

One achievement we are very proud to announce is that of our defibrillators based at Kingsway and Quedgeley Community Centres. These have now been relocated from inside the buildings to outside in designated yellow cabinets, making them accessible to the community 24 hours per day. This is something that your Town Councillors have been discussing for some time, including costs and finding the right contractor to undertake the work.

Defibrillators have been available for some years now, however your Town Councillors recognise that this live saving equipment needs to be accessible to the community at all times. The cabinets provided are unlocked as per the advice received from the Southwest Ambulance Service so in the event of an emergency, there is no time wasted trying to find a code etc, you can just open the door and take out the defibrillator. They are located very near to the front doors of the centres so easy to spot. Remember also that a defibrillator is self -explanatory. It will tell you what to do. All we ask is that you keep your eyes and ears open. Unfortunately, Quedgeley and Kingsway Community Centres suffer from a degree of vandalism and these important pieces of equipment need to be protected by all of us so that in the case of any emergency, we can rely on them being there. Moving onto a lighter subject, at the time of writing this, the weather feels just a little bit spring like, milder than we've become used to recently and some very welcome sunshine. As a result of this, Easter Eggs are now on the shelves and we are busy planning for our Easter Egg Hunt which will be held on Easter Monday at the Quedgeley Nature Reserve, in Curtis Hayward Drive. We will reserve the finer details for our insert, next month, however, suffice to say this very popular event will follow a similar format to previous years, although we think we might have a face painter this time. Please keep a look out in our office window for our Easter Poster as this will give you all the details you need.

The budget has now been set for the new financial year. It has been a difficult task this year due to the inflation costs, however as always, the town council remains mindful of everyone's financial constraints and whilst a small increase has been set which is inevitable in this current economic climate, this has been kept to a minimum whilst trying to provide maximum customer service to all our residents.

All it leaves us to say is that as we move into March, we look forward to seeing the community out and about enjoying facilities, parks, allotments etc, all of which is either managed, maintained or monitored by your Town Council. Mothering Sunday falls on Sunday 19th March this year. Services at church are as usual at 10.30am.




