
You Visit St James' church regularly...

#### "Times and Seasons": The Christian Year

#### **Ascension & Pentecost:**

Ascension Day is one of the major feasts of the Christian year; it is kept on the fortieth day after Easter and it marks the solemn close of the Lord's earthly ministry and the end of the series of appearances which he made to the disciples after His resurrection. St Luke describes what took place in the second volume of his work, the Acts of the Apostles, and notes how the eleven wondered if this is to be the time that the "Kingdom will be restored to Israel". There are also implicit references to the Ascension in the letters to the Ephesians, to the Hebrews, to Timothy, and in the first letter of Peter.

The significance of the Ascension consists in the fact that Christ's human nature was taken into heaven, from where he now exercises all power in heaven and on earth. Lifted from the earth, he is now no longer confined or constricted, and we can truly claim Jesus as Lord of All, equal in majesty and divinity with the Father.

His Ascension into heaven seals his victory over evil, suffering, and death. While this great event signals the end of one ministry, it is also the beginning of another – that of the infant Church. Jesus' last instruction to the disciples was to "stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high" - then they were to go out and carry on the work he had begun.

Ten days later they were indeed all together; the Jewish community around was observing the feast of Pentecost – the Feast of Weeks, which marked the completion of the grain harvest, fifty days (the Greek word is "Pentecost") after the offering of the barley sheaf on the feast of unleavened bread, commemorating the giving of the Law on Sinai. No doubt the small Christian community in Jerusalem would have celebrating the feast – remembering the Lord's insistence that the Law would not be changed or removed, and that it formed the basis of all his teachings to them.

While they were engaged in the feast, St Luke, again in the Acts, describes how the Holy Spirit of God was bestowed upon each of them, confirming them in their new role as Apostles and empowering them for their new work in Jesus' name. The Christian feast of Pentecost not only celebrates God the Holy Spirit but also is rightly kept as the birthday of the Christian Church and the completion of the Easter season. At some point during the fourth century it became a major feast day in its own right and was the

second preferred date, after the Easter Vigil, for the administration of Holy Baptism. (Many of us will remember the Sunday by another title – Whitsunday – a name acquired from the ceremony of clothing in white robes those who had just been baptised; "White Sunday" eventually becoming "Whitsunday" and the custom of "Whit walks" recalled the procession from the church to the place of baptism and back.) It is entirely appropriate that Baptism is linked to the feast of Pentecost because all of Christ's disciples are born again of water and the Spirit. It is also important to keep the link between Ascension and Pentecost. The risen Lord is no longer present to the Church in the body of his flesh; the Church is now to be the new body of Christ, filled with his life through the gift of the Spirit.

In the beginning of the Church life, only adults were baptised, and only then after a period of instruction – usually given during the weeks of Lent. The sacrament of baptism was then administered together with the laying-on of hands and anointing with holy oil (the sacrament we now know as "Confirmation"), and the newly-baptised would then be welcomed into the existing congregation and share in the Eucharist for the first time. It is easy to understand how new Christians, who also happened to be parents, wanted to share this wonderful experience with their children, and also to protect them in a time when infant-mortality rates were very high, so the practice of Infant Baptism came into being with parents and godparents making the solemn vows on behalf of the child. (It is worth noting that in the Orthodox tradition babies are also confirmed and communicated at their baptism, reassuring everyone that they are indeed full members of the Church, the Body of Christ on Earth. In our Anglican tradition, we celebrate Confirmation as an occasion for the re-making of Baptismal vows by those not old enough to speak for themselves, making firm what has already been promised.

The Feast of the Ascension this year falls on 10th May and Pentecost on 20th May.

We look forward to your celebrating with us in St James! We also look forward to our celebration of Confirmation in September. (If you have not been confirmed, it is still not too late to come forward; there is always room for one more! Have a quiet word with Fr John.)
