## A Letter from Canon John

#### Dear Parishioners and Friends,

The first signs of winter are upon us and perhaps this is a good time to remind ourselves that the month of November is also known as the month of Remembrance and Reflection.

This year is particularly significant as it is the 100th anniversary of the ending of the First World War. Woodrow Wilson, American President coined the phrase 'The war to end all wars'. Unfortunately, it didn't and in 1939 the country was at war once again with Germany. However, this became a civilian's war where the fighting was not just confined to a battle field but to the towns and cities of Europe. Young people of several generations spent most of their early twenties and latter teenage years fighting for their country. Some never returned.

This year, to mark the ending of the First World War (or Great War as it is sometimes referred to) public places are being asked to erect a silhouette of a soldier known as 'there but not there Tommy'. In Saint James' Churchyard, I am proud to say and thanks to Quedgeley Town Council a "Tommy" now firmly stands beside the war memorial.

In many parts of the world today there is still conflict; wars are still being fought and human life being sacrificed. As a church we pray constantly for those countries, that peace will once again return.

On Remembrance Sunday here at Saint James' we shall be holding our act of remembrance with the wider town community at the war memorial. We will again remember all those who gave their lives for their country - and who still continue to serve this country in our armed forces home and abroad.

Finally, I would just like to thank all those who sent me prayers and good wishes on the appointment of my becoming an Honorary Canon at Gloucester Cathedral. As I have said I see this appointment as recognition for the whole parish of Quedgeley and Kingsway and not just for myself.

With every blessing and let us remember the fallen of conflict and pray for peace.

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## **HIGHLIGHTS OF FIFTY YEARS!**

Quite a number of people have been asking me recently in the wake of my fifty years of priesthood celebrations, what the highlights of this half a century have been.

In the week following the event, Richard Atkins asked me to pick on one such highlight in an interview I did with him for Radio Gloucestershire. Put on the spot my response was — that moment when the Bishop of Hereford placed his hands on my head to make me a Priest in the Church of God.



This set me off thinking what other highlights there have been over these years, and these are just some that come to mind.

The Sunday after I became a priest when I celebrated what was known as my First Mass and I uttered the words of the Consecration Prayer over the Bread and the Wine of the Eucharist

The visit of the Princess Royal for the opening of St Thomas Cantilupe Primary School where I became Chairman of Governors.

The visit of the late Princess Margaret to perform the Opening Ceremony of St Barnabas Church and centre in the parish in Hereford where I was Vicar.

My marriage to Jackie and Nuptial Mass at All Saints Hereford, and the birth of our twins, Lucy and Hannah a few years later

The visit of the Princess Royal for the opening of the new Matson Neighbourhood Centre when I was parish priest there.

My eight years on General Synod, particularly when, as a central member of what was then called the Crown Appointments Commission, we were invited to Tea at 10 Downing Street when the Prime Minister of the day wanted to hear of our thoughts on the next Archbishop pf Canterbury. n.b. We did not tell him!

My appointment as an Honorary Canon of Gloucester Cathedral.

To be in the procession at the Enthronement of Rowan Williams in Canterbury Cathedral.

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Our ten years in Spain in the Diocese in Europe where I had the privilege of being Area Dean, Assistant Director of Ordinands and Honorary Canon of Gibraltar Cathedral.

AND LAST – but not least – that wonderful Eucharist in Gloucester Cathedral on the Feast of St Michael & All Angels this year to celebrate these fifty years!

For all this, and so much more, I constantly thank God and all those around me who have made this service possible.

## "Times and Seasons": Saints in November

**1st: All Saints** – From the earliest days, the Church has recognised as its foundation stones those heroes of the faith whose lives have excited others to holiness and have assumed a communion with the Church on earth and the Church in heaven. Celebrating the feast of All Saints began in the 4th century and was originally observed on the Sunday after the feast of Pentecost, acknowledging the power of the Holy Spirit in his empowering of the first Apostles and martyrs for the faith. It was moved to 1st November in the 8th century when a chapel in St Peter's in Rome was dedicated to All Saints.

**2nd:** Commemoration of All Souls In Christ all the faithful, both living and departed, are bound together in a communion of prayer. This is the purpose of the celebration on this day. Since its foundation, Christians have recognised that the Church, the chosen people of God, is at its most perfect when it recognises its unity in God's redeeming love with all those who have said, and who say now, and who will say in the fullness of time, "Jesus is Lord".

**3rd:** Richard Hooker, Anglican priest & scholar Born in Exeter in 1554, Richard, in his formative years, came under the guidance of the then Bishop of Salisbury. After studying at Oxford he was ordained and served the Church in London. He was a strong advocate of the Anglican tradition, the "middle way" between puritanism and papalism. He showed in his writings that the Church of England was firmly rooted in both Scripture and tradition, affirming its continuity with the pre-Reformation Church, but both catholic and reformed. Richard died near Canterbury in 1600.

**6th: William Temple, Archbishop of Canterbury** Born in Exeter in 1881, William's father was Bishop of Exeter and later Archbishop of Canterbury. William excelled in his academic studies, becoming a philosopher and theologian of note. At the age of forty he became a bishop and within ten years was Archbishop of York. He was heavily involved in the ecumenical movement within the various Christian denominations and was well-known for his concern for social issues, contributing significantly to the debate which led to the foundation of the welfare state. He became Archbishop of Canterbury in 1942.

**11th:** Martin of Tours, Bishop Martin was born in 316AD in the Roman province we now know as Hungary. He was a Christian and also an officer in the Roman army. He found these two roles conflicted, and under the influence of Hilary, Bishop of Poitiers, he founded the first monastery in France, in Bishop Hilary's

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province. This religious house became a centre for missionary work in the local countryside – a new venture, when all other such centres were town-based. In 372 Martin was elected Bishop of Tours, but continued to live his monastic lifestyle, stressing the importance of a ministry to all people. He died in office in 397.

**16th:** Margaret of Scotland Margaret was born in 1046, the daughter of the Anglo-Saxon royal house of England. She lived in exile in Hungary during the reign of Danish kings in England. After the Norman conquest, when her royal person was still a threat to the new monarchy, she was welcomed to the royal court of Scotland, eventually marrying king Malcolm III. Her Christian faith had a great influence, not only on her husband and the court, but across the land. She instituted several church reforms and founded many monasteries, churches, and pilgrim hostels. She was a woman of prayer, well-known for her good works, and seems to have been an influence for good on many who came in contact. She died in 1093.

19th: Hilda, Abbess of Whitby Hilda was born into the royal house of Northumbria in 614AD. She was baptised at the age of 12 by Paulinus, the first Bishop of York, and later became an influential lay leader of the Church. Aidan of Lindisfarne persuaded her to be a Religious and she subsequently established a monastery at Whitby. The house became a centre of Christian study and in 664 was the venue for the great Synod of Whitby, where Hilda became, along with Wilfrid of Hexham, one of the great reconcilers between the Roman and Celtic traditions of the Church in Britain. She died on 17th November, 680AD.

**30th: Andrew the Apostle, Patron Saint of Scotland** It is in John's gospel that we discover most about Andrew. He was a Galilean fisherman, mending his nets, when Jesus called him (and his brother, Peter) to follow him — which he promptly did, remaining with Jesus until the end. He was present at the feeding of the 5,000, and later introduced a group of Greeks to Jesus. Tradition tells us that Andrew undertook several missionary journeys, eventually being martyred on an X-shaped cross. He is a patron saint of Greece and his connection with Scotland stems from a vision of his X-shaped cross appearing in the blue skies over Bannockburn before the famous victory. It is also said that his remains were brought to Scotland in the 8th century.
