So here I am able to spend time in prayer, thought, and resolve to make the day special.



A Tribute to David Fowler RIP

David, our friend, took a full part in the life of St James' Church and was also a stalwart of the 'Open the Book' team helping to present Bible stories to local primary school children over a period of 10 years or more. He played kings, soldiers, priests and prophets. He was proud to play Moses leading God's people out of Egypt and proud to play Eli teaching Samuel in the Temple. He played Jeremiah down the well: 'I know my place,' he'd say with a laugh and he played Zacchaeus up a tree: 'Careful David!' And many a time, of course, he played a disciple of Jesus, a role he felt very much at home in. He was extremely reliable and hardly missed a week. To our benefit, he was very knowledgeable about the Bible and was a kind, helpful, talented member of the team.

David always enjoyed the social life of St James – coffee mornings, church fayres, concerts, Chit Chat and outings. He loved telling stories about his life, often with a humorous anecdote thrown in; always ready with a quip and a joke. Similarly, he enjoyed hearing other people's stories, too. Nothing was better than to hear David's infectious laugh.

He was full of surprises. He could sing! He loved to sing.

For a number of years he was a member of a male voice choir and travelled to many places in Britain to perform. He

also sang in the Gloucester Christian Choir and more recently was welcomed into 'Angie's Choir' in Kingsway. Nothing was more uplifting than to hear David burst into song with quite unexpected confidence. He certainly loved to sing in church and knew many, many hymns off by heart.

All of us here at St James will miss him and we know that his friends from Woodlands Park and members of the Methodist Church will join with us in missing him too.

David, you were always ready with a smile - polite, patient, respectful and forgiving, a man of great humility — a gentleman. Thank you for being part of our lives, for being our friend and for showing us your love of God and your love of our Lord, Jesus.

"Times & Seasons" - Saints in July

3rd: Thomas the Apostle

John's gospel reveals the significance of Thomas "the Twin". Firstly, he is heard encouraging the other disciples to go to Judea with Jesus, then later engaging in a debate with Jesus which elicits the answer that Jesus is himself the Way. Most famously he was the Apostle unconvinced by reports of a resurrected Jesus, causing Jesus to show Thomas the wounds received at the crucifixion. Thomas then proclaims the words that have been described as the great climax to John's gospel: "My Lord and my God!" Thomas later travelled to India and is regarded as the founder of the Christian Church there.

6th: Thomas More, Martyr of the Reformation

Born in 1478, Thomas studied classics and law, and was called to the Bar aged twenty-three. His honesty and integrity impressed Henry VIII and he appointed Thomas as his Chancellor. Thomas supported the king in his efforts to reform the clergy but disagreed over Henry's disputes with the papacy, caused by the king's desire to annul his marriage to Catherine of Aragon. Henry could not stand this act of defiance and Thomas was imprisoned in the hope that he would renege. When Thomas refused to take the Oath on the Act of Succession, which declared the king to be supreme protector and head of the Church in England, he was executed on this day in 1535, declaring that he died the king's good servant but God's first.

11th: Benedict of Nursia, Father of Western Monasticism

Benedict was born in Nursia, central Italy, in 480. He went to study in Rome, but was appalled by the corruption in society and so withdrew to live as a hermit in Subiaco. Others felt compelled to join him, and soon small monasteries were established in the neighbourhood. In 525 an attempt was made on Benedict's life, so he moved with a small group of monks to Monte Casino, where he wrote his Rule of Life for Monks, based on his own experiences of people striving to live out the gospel. His "Rule" was so good that it was widely published and followed, and is still the model for all religious communities in western Europe. He died on this day in 550.

14th: John Keble, Priest, poet, Tractarian

Born in 1792, the son of a priest, John Keble was a brilliant scholar, becoming a Fellow of Oriel College Oxford at the age of nineteen, a few years before his ordination. He won great praise for his collections of poems, "The Christian Year" (note: it is still in print), and was elected professor of poetry in Oxford in 1831.

John was a leader of the Tractarian movement, which protested at the threats to the Church from liberal developments in both politics and theology. He did not seek preferment and in 1836 became vicar of a parish near Winchester where he remained until his death in 1866. He continued to write, and was praised for his scholarship and godly counsel. He is best remembered for the sermon he preached in Oxford on this day in 1833, considered to be the beginning of the Oxford Movement, a time of revival and strengthening of the Church of England.

The Keble family have strong links with Fairford and Bisley here in Gloucestershire.

18th: Elizabeth Ferard, first Deaconess of the Church of England

Bishop Tait of London encouraged Elizabeth to visit deaconess communities in Germany, with the result that in November 1861 she and a group of women dedicated themselves "to minister to the necessities of the Church" as servants of the Church, and on this day in 1862 she received the first deaconess licence from Bishop Tait. She founded a community of deaconesses within a religious sisterhood, working first in a poor parish in the King's Cross area of London before moving to Notting Hill in 1873. She died in active ministry on Easter Day, 1883.

22nd: Mary Magdalene

All four gospels give Mary Magdalene a unique place among the followers of Jesus. From Magdala, near the sea of Galilee, she is described by Luke as having been healed by Jesus before accompanying him during his ministry. Along with other faithful women, she stayed beside the Cross and was the first to discover the empty tomb. She was privileged with the first appearance of the risen Lord and was charged with the task of relaying the good news to the other disciples and friends.

25th: James the Apostle

James was a Galilean fisherman who, with his brother John, having been prepared by John the Baptist, was called to be one of the first Apostles of Jesus. He was a witness to the Transfiguration, and was there in the garden of Gethsemane. He and his brother annoyed the others by asking to sit beside the Lord when he came in his glory. They were present for the appearances of Christ after his resurrection. James was executed, probably in the year 44AD, on the orders of Herod Agrippa, who had hoped in vain that, by disposing of the Christian leaders, he could stem the flow of those hearing the good need and becoming followers of the Way. James is celebrated as our Patron Saint.




