This month we see the end of Easter tide. Forty days after the Resurrection, Jesus took his disciples to the Mount of Olives. They watched as he ascended into heaven to be with the Father.


We celebrate this event on Ascension Day and this year it falls on the Thursday 30<sup>th</sup> May. If you attend the early morning service at Gloucester Cathedral, you will probably witness the choir of the cathedral climbing the steps of the tower, where they will sing, their voices echoing over the entire city. This used to be a tradition all over the country, but in some places this has died out, due to safety reasons.

So what is so significant about the Ascension? Clearly it was the time when Jesus recognized that his time on earth had come to an end. He had accomplished all that he had intended to. The Father had sent his son as a new-born baby born in Bethlehem and now he was returning to the Father to 'prepare a place for us' as Saint John's Gospel states. As Christians the Resurrection and Ascension are two of the most significant events to take place in the New Testament. Jesus showed us that death is not the end, just like him, we can rise in glory with a promise of a new and eternal life.

We recently visited Krakow in Poland, a most beautiful city, which once was the Capital City with many churches, castles and great places of interest not least The Ghetto, enough said about that! We spent a day at the Auschwitz and Birkenau Concentration Camps, which are about 90 minutes travelling by road from Krakow. Here we saw the way that man treated man (and women and children) in World War 2. The general consensus of the 20 or so who made the journey was "glad I went, don't want to go again" really quite a harrowing experience.

We also visited Portsmouth where we were invited to the inspection at TS Alacrity, a Naval Group who have been up in Quedgeley several times taking part in our events. They fixed up a visit to the Mary Rose for us which was extremely interesting.

We are now getting ready to visit (some of us for the 11th time) Ypres in Belgium and to take part in the Menin Gate Ceremony which takes place every day of the year including Christmas Day. Here the Last Post is played in memory of all those British and Empire members of the military who were killed in World War 1. We are laying 9 wreaths on this visit. This time we are making a presentation to the Chairman of the Last Post Association who organise this daily Service no matter what the weather or time of year. We as always have a full coachload travelling (and we have a waiting list). The Last Post is also played at Ploegsteert on the Messines Ridge where our Secretary Margaret Slatter lays a wreath on the memorial of her Grand Father.

On Saturday June 1st we have a Quiz Night at the Thatch in Bristol Road, Quedgeley which starts at 7.00pm. # **Quiet Day at Prinknash Abbey**



## **Mothering Sunday March 2019**



### "Looking to the future": St James' Away-Day at Prinknash

On the 30<sup>th</sup> March thirty-six members of St James church made their way to Prinknash Abbey to give thanks for the life we share together at St James Quedgeley. We were privileged to have the Reverend Guy Treweek with us to lead our thoughts and help us focus not only on what we have done together, but how we can go on building the Church in our parish.

We began by reflecting on the content of our "parish profile" - the document prepared by the church council when the parish was without a full-time priest. What work was being done, and what

was needed in the future? There were several challenges: reaching out to young families and newcomers to the parish; building links with the local schools; caring for the older population; ensuring that our church was on a sound financial footing, so that the church building could be maintained and fit-for-purpose.

Father Guy asked us: "What excites you? Where has God placed you? What terrifies you? What can you give thanks for?" Father John gave a summary of things that have been achieved, and work that still needs to be carried out. He mentioned "Chatterbox" & "Chit Chat", the involvement in local schools, especially in the two church schools Clearwater and Field Court Infants. The church council has been grappling with the plan to re-order the church interior; new study groups have now begun, the Church's healing ministry has increased; fund-raising events have provided vital financial resources.

Using post-it notes, we answered Fr Guy's questions. When it came to thanksgiving, there was a large number of responses which expressed thanks for the welcome which people had received on arrival at St James, and the friendships which have been formed. There were thanks for the support and encouragement given by all the clergy and for the prayer-support from the church family. Several people gave thanks for having a church building which is open and available - "we appreciate being able to use our church, not only for public worship but also for private prayer."

The responses tell how grateful we are for a listening ear – both human and divine, and for being able to "open up" to God and being able to share our faith (and our worries) with each other, and for being part of a rich Christian heritage.

What excites us? "Welcoming the children from Field Court to our Wednesday Eucharist, and the young families who come to STJ's." "Seeing so many mums and toddlers coming to Chatterbox". "The opportunity to study together and ask questions at our 'Come & Find Out' and our Lent & Advent groups".



"It is important to get involved in community action – supporting local charities, visiting local care homes, meeting families preparing for baptism, caring for the bereaved."

The Prinknash catering staff provided an excellent, and varied, lunch menu. As the weather was kind to us, we were able to take advantage of the lovely setting of the Abbey and spend some time in personal reflection or quiet debate with others.

Having thought about our present activities, we moved on to think about our priorities. Fr Guy gave us a verse from St Matthew – chapter 23 v 23: "Woe to you, Scribes & Pharisees..." where Jesus challenges our motives. How do we portray justice, mercy, and faithfulness? How we keep the two great commandments to love God and to love our neighbour as ourselves? Our call is: "To be faithful, in this season, with these people. God will do the rest."

We were reminded that day by day, week by week, we have encounters with all kinds of people, and we have opportunities to minister to them. The gardeners among us know all about sowing, waiting, and harvesting; the same is true in our encounters with

people. There are always chances to "sow the seed" - by the things we say and do - and then the time of waiting for the "seed" to grow, before we can "gather in" to our Christian family. We were also reminded that God calls each one of us to work for him, just where we are; how are we to respond?

Our Eucharist gives us a shape for our lives and ministry – offering, receiving, sharing, and commissioning. Just as we offer gifts & lives to God, so we offer to one another. While receive essential gifts from God, we also receive from one another - as long as we are

At the end of our day together, we celebrated the Eucharist, at which the gospel reading was taken from St John chapter 4 - Jesus'



encounter with a Samaritan woman at Jacob's well. His request for a drink led on to a conversation about "living water" and resulted in a large group of friends coming to Jesus. Through a chance meeting, new life and new hope came into being.

The final words to us were quite brief: "Be encouraged! God has placed us in his world, in a lively community; Go in peace, to love and serve the Lord!"
