# Bible readings for today

St John. 14. 15 - 21 Jesus prepares the disciples for his departure from them and gives them a number of promises.

# THOUGHT FOR THE WEEK

#### Promises from Jesus

We all make promises - to our spouses at our wedding, for our Godchildren at their Baptism, to our bishop when we were ordained, to our children on all kinds of occasions - and sometimes we have to be brutally honest and admit that a promise is impossible to make because we know that it will be impossible to keep.

But part of the joy of the Easter season is in knowing that the promises Jesus made, to his first disciples in Jerusalem and to his disciples at St James Quedgeley, have all been kept and are still bearing fruit.

"I will not leave you orphans, I will come back to you.." - and on the first Easter Sunday he was raised, given new life and restored to them.

"I will ask the Father and he will give you another Advocate..."; and fifty days later that is exactly what happened on the day of Pentecost. The disciples were empowered by the Holy Spirit to go out and continue the work Jesus had begun.

"You will do greater things than these...". Three years' ministry in a small Middle Eastern province of the Roman empire is still growing, two thousand years later, into a worldwide family of believers who still share his word and receive his sacramental presence at every Eucharist.

The fact that these promises have already come true enables us to believe that there is still more to come. "Those who love me will be loved by my Father" - note the future tense - it has not all happened yet! Christians are people of hope, real hope, because of all that has happened; we can look forward with joy for even better things to come. "Because I live, you too will live."

Today's gospel-reading is part of Jesus' farewell discourse which he delivered in the Upper Room on Maundy Thursday at the Last Supper. The disciples were distraught to hear that he was really about to leave them; we can imagine the thoughts that must have been racing round: How were they going to carry on? How could they live without him? Jesus gave them all these promises, reminding them of all that he had said to them and all the wonderful acts they had witnessed.

He reminded them - he reminds us: that God the Holy Trinity is always with us, re-creating, resurrecting, and above all, loving. It is when we dare to love, to commit ourselves body and soul, that we do indeed experience the love of God - a love that is stronger than death.
