

Bible readings for today:

First Reading. Isaiah 55. 1 - 5

God invites everyone who thirsts to come to the waters, and those with no money to share wine and milk for free. God promises an everlasting covenant with David, drawing in all the nations.

Second Reading. Romans 9. 1 - 5

Paul laments for his Jewish kindred, to whom belongs God's covenant. Longing for them to believe, Paul wishes he were cut off from Christ for their sake.

Alleluia:

We do not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God.

Gospel. Matthew 14. 13 - 21

Jesus withdraws from the crowd in a boat, but the five thousand men, together with women and children, follow him on foot. Jesus provides for all their needs, healing the sick, and feeding them miraculously with only five loaves and two fish.

"Thought for the Week": The Revd. Ann: "Feeding the 5,000"

We human beings are complex creatures - we feel so many different emotions - are drawn in many different ways - even in opposite directions - as we see in Paul's letter to Romans.

The pain in Paul's words is noticeable, especially after the victorious assurance at the end of chapter 8. Paul has been telling us that *nothing* can separate us from the love of God in Jesus Christ our Lord, and now we move into this howl of lament. The problem, as Paul sees it, is just relying on the Law and our own efforts to keep it. It remains a common human desire to tie God down. But we are doomed to failure if we are relying on anything other than God himself. We have to trust in God, in his generosity and mercy, not on any righteousness we think we might have performed.

In our gospel reading, when the disciples come to Jesus and ask him to send the people away, thinking that they are being kind and thoughtful. Jesus came out to be on his own, and he has been mobbed - so - Their first kind thought: "Let's carve out a bit of space for Jesus."

Their second kind thought: "The people have come along way - they're going to start getting tired and hungry any minute now - for their sakes too - it's time they went home."

Notice the disciples carefully do not mention their own needs.

At first, it looks as though, in response to their kindness, Jesus is giving them an impossible task. "You feed them" he says. Their response is confusion: "How on earth do we do that?"

But actually, all he is asking is one small response - just 5 loaves and 2 fishes - and Jesus is the one who will make it food for 5,000.

"You feed them" - is only daunting if you don't trust the generosity of God.

I wonder what God is asking us to do. Whatever it is - we won't have to do it alone!

Fr John's Notes:

Worship in Church on Sundays continues

according to the following pattern:.

There will be TWO celebrations of the Eucharist:

9am Holy Eucharist (Said)

9.45am Church will be cleaned / sanitised

11am Holy Eucharist (Said)

11.45am Church will be cleaned / sanitised

Each service will take approximately 30 - 45 minutes and there will be a strict limit of **30 people** at each service.

A single service sheet will be available for use, which we shall ask you to take away afterwards and there will be some necessary changes to our usual pattern.

(e.g.: No sharing of The Peace; Communion will be given in one kind only; there will be no offertory procession - we shall indicate where you may leave your financial gifts. We shall be unable to serve coffee afterwards.)

To comply with Government "Track & tracing" requirements, we have been asked to keep a list (names only) of those attending.

Social-distancing & hygiene guidelines will be in place; GREEN seating markers will be in place.

The church will remain open for private prayer on Sundays from 12noon - 4pm.

The Eucharist during Midweek:

The **10am Wednesday Eucharist** will return on **Wednesday this week, 5th August**, when we shall keep the **Feast of the Transfiguration** of Jesus. We shall asking the congregation to sit in the **GREEN seats** in the nave and sadly no coffee will be served afterwards. *(The Wednesday 7.30pm Eucharist will need to wait a little longer.)*
