"Thought for the Week" : Fr Gordon

'He has gone out of his mind'

CS Lewis once wrote that 'Jesus was either mad, bad, or the Son of God'.

Two stories interlink in Sunday's Gospel reading. There's firstly, an enquiry from Jesus' family and then a clash with the scribes. They illuminate each other and raise sharp questions.

We shouldn't be surprised at the disruption Jesus' ministry caused to the prevailing culture, society and faith of his day. And all this prompts onlookers, commentators and critics to surmise that this could be the work of Satan.

Jesus' critics - the Scribes - were searching for an explanation of what was going on. The key to understanding their concerns lies in the telling comment that Jesus had 'gone out of his mind'.

And that is why his family effectively tried to place a detention order on him: 'they went out to restrain him'. It's so easy to misunderstand Jesus in this way.

Is Jesus mad, or possessed? How does he tackle the forces of evil? Has he made a pact with the devil? Jesus' ministry is neither mad nor bad. It's the arrival of the kingdom of God. His power to tackle evil in other people's lives comes because he has faced and overcome it himself.

His ministry entails letting out, freeing and liberating lots of issues, infirmities and people that have, hitherto, been all locked up. This is hugely traumatic and disruptive for wider society. People living with tormenting afflictions are suddenly, beautifully, wildly and wonderfully free.

For the onlookers, for His critics, this was unsettling, to say the least.

Sometimes it is easier to keep the delineations clear between sick and well, sane and insane. But Jesus, by healing so many afflicted people, radically reorders society.

Some, including his family, would have preferred to restrain Jesus at this point. His response was simple: whoever does the will of God is my kindred.

Jesus accepted that life is a struggle between good and evil, and there's no doubt on which side he stood. For Jesus healing is a defeat of evil. Jesus wanted people to be whole and healthy. Jesus cared for the whole person - body, mind and spirit and not just part of them.

Jesus constantly risked his own safety and security for us. As Christians, we are often called to share in this same risky adventure.
