We had a good chat over tea and donuts and we worked out how to do it. With Andrew Wakely's help I found images to use online and we projected them onto old vinyl posters to act as templates. With these Gloucester Men's Shed were able to cut out the life size figures. The photo shows Emily and I collecting them in September, which was a joy. From September onwards Andrew worked hard painting them and putting them into a frame. With timed lighting the new nativity scene in the churchyard has been a joyful and beautiful tradition to Advent and Christmas and there was a chance to share it too as it lends itself well to being towed on a trailer with carols playing, allowing us to share the Christmas story right across Quedgeley. What I am praying about...



It might seem odd but right now I am praying that we will all come to see how poor we really are before we are faced with the worst of consequences. Many of us have been shocked at some of the richest people in the world losing so much of what they held most dear. Aren't these wealthy people supposed to be rich enough to ride this out? Even some of the seemingly wealthiest will struggle to recover from the total loss of homes and property in the face of floods, hurricanes and wildfires. Anyone who has less than 100 million in the

bank will at least feel the effect and if you have less than 10 million you may lose everything. For those already poor the loss of everything is utterly devastating but poverty reaches even to the seemingly wealthy when such rich people may also lose everything and be left homeless.

Wildfires, floods and hurricanes kill and take wealth indiscriminately and whether it be the floods in Spain, the wildfires in LA, the Hurricanes in Florida or impacts local to Gloucestershire like flooding, land slips, every stronger winds, human made Climate Change is having a huge impact on all of us. These effects were entirely predictable and as a climate scientist I remember attending many workshops some twenty years ago when what is happening now was accurately predicted. The tragedy is that twenty years ago we could have acted to avoid the consequences so many are now suffering. We can still stop things getting worse but we need to know that this is a threat to all of us and one that will cost more and more over time. At the time of writing the destruction in LA alone is estimated at 150 billion US dollars for the 15 days of the fire so this number is rising by an average 10 billion every day the fires continue. The problem is that so many of us have not realised our own poverty. We are voting and making daily choices for the comforts of the day to day things we know without realising the many looming deadly threats posed by climate change. We need to seek those same comforts but risk trying new ways to achieve them - moving to electric alternatives, supporting renewable schemes. The alternative to trying new things with some risk is to accept a comfortable pathway to destruction.

My prayer is for those who have lost everything already. My prayer is that we come to know our own poverty in sinfully breaking our covenant of care for creation with our Creator and creation itself. I pray that we will come to know our poverty of love and care before the very worst poverty and death and destruction gets so very much worse. I pray that we begin to know our own poverty and seek the riches of his Grace. I pray that we are led into the riches of new life and away from the deadly poverty of our sin. AMEN.

WHAT MAKES A COMMUNITY?


Dictionary definitions of the word COMMUNITY differ.

Rebecca – Brave and Resourceful By Fr. Gordon



Rebecca, a brave and resourceful young woman, was the wife of Isaac and the mother of Jacob and Esau. She is prominent in four episodes in the early patriarchal history of God's people.

Firstly, it's a beautiful story of a journey, by Isaac, to find a suitable wife. Rebecca was the girl who guided Abraham's

servant in his quest to find the right wife for Isaac. The servant, Eliezer, devised a test.

As he stood at the central well in Abraham's birthplace with his men and ten camels laden with goods, he prayed to God 'Let the girl to whom I shall say, 'Please offer your jar that I may drink,' and who shall say, 'Drink, and I will water your camels' - let her be the one whom you have appointed for your servant Isaac'.

To his surprise, a beautiful young girl – Rebecca - immediately came out and offered to draw water for him to drink, as well as water to fill the troughs for all his camels. She was a good match for Isaac, and became his much-loved wife.

For a long time Rebecca was barren. Twenty years elapsed before Isaac and Rebecca had children; throughout that time, both prayed fervently for offspring. God eventually answered their prayers; in due course Rebecca bore twins - Esau and Jacob.

The boys had very different temperaments and the conflict between them set a pattern for conflict between later generations and nations.

Much later a famine struck the land of Israel and Isaac moved his family to Gerar, which was ruled by Abimelech, king of the Philistines. Like Abraham before him, who called Sarah his "sister" rather than his "wife" so that the Egyptians would not kill him and take his wife, Isaac told the people of Gerar that Rebecca was his sister.

She was not molested, but one day Abimelech looked through the window and saw Isaac making love with her. Abimelech called Isaac and said, 'Surely, this woman is your wife! How could you say, "She is my sister"?' Isaac replied, 'I thought I might be killed because of her.' Abimelech then warned others not to touch Rebecca. Eventually Isaac parted from Abimelech in peace.

Finally, we see an apparent less attractive side of Rebecca's character in her ruse to obtain Isaac's blessing for her favoured son Jacob rather than Esau. Esau, born first, should have inherited the role of tribal leader, but Rebecca judged that Jacob would be better at this task than his older brother. She and Jacob tricked Isaac, old and blind, into giving the leadership to Jacob. Rebecca wanted the tribal leader chosen for his intelligence rather than his popularity.

Rebecca developed from a beautiful, confident young girl into a far-sighted and shrewd woman. She chose the son she believed was more capable of governing the clan.

Rebecca's story reveals an ambitious, loving, deceitful and self-sacrificing woman. A woman playing her part in God's plan for humanity, which is beyond our understanding.

Welcome to 2025

"The Year of Faith"

You may well reply: "Isn't every year a year of faith for Christians?", and I would reply: "Yes, of course". But this year has been given this special because of a very special anniversary which will occur in a few months time. This year marks the 1,700th anniversary of the Council of Nicea in 325AD, an historic series of meetings which proclaimed the statement of faith which the worldwide Church uses week by week and which we call the Nicene Creed: "We believe in one God..."





The council was summoned by the Roman Emperor Constantine, who was a committed Christian, and who was concerned about a serious division which was growing within the Church. He called for a meeting of bishops, priests and deacons from across the Empire to gather at Nicea in northwest Turkey; 318 bishops attended, together with a number of priests and deacons – including some from Britain. This was the first of what became known as the great Ecumenical Councils of the Church; the meeting began on 20th May and concluded on 25th July. (*No more complaints about the length of our church council meetings please!*)

Constantine opened proceedings with a plea for unity within the Church, reminding everyone of the prayer of Jesus in St John's Gospel : "that they all may be one.." . He then handed over the chairmanship to Bishop Horius of Cordova (Spain) who

outlined the threat to the Church's unity which was posed by the followers of Arius, a man of Libyan origin who was at the time a priest in Alexandria in Egypt. (It would seem that Arius was not present at the council but his teaching was supported by the Bishop of Nicomedia.

Arius taught that Jesus the Son was subordinate to the Father and was not therefore fully divine and was created by God the Father before the work of Creation began. He believed that it was impossible for God to suffer and die (as Jesus did); for Arius, this proved that Jesus was not fully divine. By teaching this line of thought Arius was contradicting what the Church had taught from the beginning that God is Three – in – One, Father, Son, & Holy Spirit, undivided and equal in power and majesty.

At the Council, this Arian creed was proposed by the aforementioned bishop-supporter, and was instantly rejected. Members were reminded, by delegates from the churches in Palestine, of the lengthy gospel accounts of the Lord's suffering, death, and resurrection. The Bishop of Caesarea presented a Profession of Faith which was in use by the Church in and around Jerusalem. After the inclusion of the phrase "Jesus the Son is of the same substance as the Father" (in other words, co-equal), this Creed was accepted.

It is recorded that only two of the 318 bishops voted against accepting this statement as being the true definition of the basic and true ("Orthodox") Christian faith. These two were removed from office and banished.

The Council went on to compile twenty "Canons" - (*church laws – we still have Canon Law today*) – they covered items such as the positions of the churches in Rome and Constantinople (*later to become the centres of the Church in the West [Rome] and East [Constantinople*]); Penitential rites for use with those who had lapsed and wished to return, Holy Communion for Dying, and a rule concerning standing for prayer during Eastertide.

The Council was closed (some would say, adjourned) by Constantine proclaiming the "Nicene Creed". (He used the pronoun "We" not because he was the Emperor but to emphasise the point he spoke on behalf of all the delegates and all those who would receive the statement from them. A brief statement at the time, it stressed the unity of the Holy Trinity and the belief that Jesus, the Son of God, is both fully human and divine.

Within two years of the meeting of the Council, the Nicene Creed as we know and use it today was in use by the Church.

During season of Lent this year we will providing opportunities for us to discover more about this great document and discover what it means for us in this "Year of Faith" and beyond.

Creation Care as Winter Becomes Spring by Revd. Mark

Sometimes this column considers how we can care for creation, sometimes why but the most important question for me is who we are and who we become as we care for creation together. It may feel like Christmas is long over but for Mary and Joseph at that first Christmas it was only really over when they completed the Jewish custom of presenting their new born baby in the Temple in Jerusalem, forty days after he was born. Forty of course connects this Jewish tradition to the forty days of the great flood and the forty years in the wilderness having escaped



slavery in Egypt. Simeon and Anna were two elderly folk who seldom, if ever, left the Temple. Simeon has been visited by the Holy Spirit and told that he would meet the Messiah and Anna is described as a prophetess. Both of them are filled with joy at meeting this new life, who they recognise as the saviour of the world, the renewer of all Creation. This is the great economy of scripture, the faithfulness and patience of Simeon and Anna ends in the greatest hope, the renewal of all Creation in Jesus our saviour. Perhaps if you have witnessed the joy of so many grandparents in meeting a new grandchild for the first time you will have your own understanding of how, in the economy of God, Life always wins over death in the end. As Simeon says:

Now, Lord, you let your servant go in peace: your word has been fulfilled.

My own eyes have seen the salvation which you have prepared in the sight of every people;

A light to reveal you to the nations and the glory of your people Israel. (Luke 2.29-32)

When we are faithful and patient we can have hope. Just as Winter becomes Spring we can all be, young and old, a blessing to each other and to our fellow Creation.

Next Steps - Update



At the start of this project, it was said that the intention was to keep everybody informed and up to date about what's happening with the re-ordering project. In every issue of the Spire since, there has been an update. We have been consistent in the message inviting you to ask questions if you have them, and that remains our request.

To recap the major points so far as we start the new year:-

Discussions have taken place with the Diocesan Advisory Committee (DAC) to gain their help in preparing the project which has been forthcoming in good measure.

Surveys have been undertaken on accessibility, asbestos, repairs to the windows, and the eco effectiveness of our use of energy for heat, light etc.

Professional advice is continuing on establishing the historical and liturgical significance of the building, its contents and furnishings, including the pews and floor. This is an ongoing process, the results of which will be included in the official 'Statement of Significance' for the DAC. There is ongoing consultation with community groups.

In relation to funding and finance, we have looked at the way the grant process works particularly in relation to the national lottery, and are focussing our attention on the areas most likely to be fruitful for our requirements. Success, it seems from the experience of other churches, sometimes comes at the second or third attempts and we shall keep that in mind as we move forward. Research and initial strategy decisions about funding pathways are at the next stage of development.

A first draft Architect's Brief is being prepared for presentation to your PCC for their comment and or approval. This, when agreed, will form the basis of our request for them to provide options which meet our criteria. The Church family along with others will then be invited to comment and a final decision is made by the PCC on the way forward.

The next steps for the early days of the new year will include a study of the Victorian floor tiles and a continuing review of the new funding arrangements.

So as before, and as always we invite you to make contact with Mark or myself or any other of the Next Steps group if you have any questions.

A life-size nativity scene, crafted by the Gloucester Men's Shed and displayed on a trailer, spread festive cheer to the local residents of Quedgeley.

Mark Siddall, Priest in Charge at St James, Quedgeley and unofficial Chaplain to the Gloucester Men's Shed, said: "I thought the area around the church would lend itself really well to a life-size nativity scene. The Men's Shed brought this

vision to life, crafting the figures from plywood, which were then carefully painted by St James' churchwarden, Andrew Wakely."

The nativity float, which was transported around Quedgeley and accompanied by recorded carol music, visited older areas and newly built estates in Quedgeley.

"It's been a really great way of sharing the Christmas story with the whole community," Mark explained. "Some new estates are too large for traditional carollers to visit everyone, and the new estates often don't have the tradition of carollers coming round.

"Also, for people who are bed bound, and who get knocks on their door after dark, it can be a bit scary, so having carols played on the float outside allowed people to come to the door if they were able or chose to. Others watched from their window."
