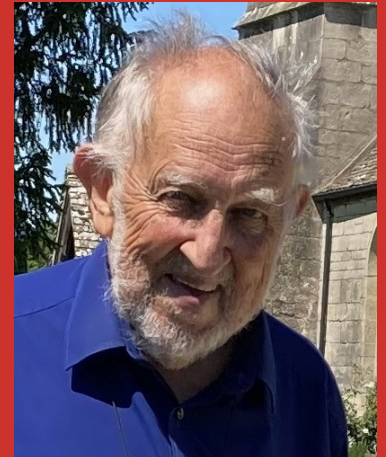

Once again we've had a busy month. Our Spring Fayre held on 17th May was a huge success and we've managed to capture a few photos from the event.


Our community groups are active and we have some reports of what's been happening in and around Quedgeley.

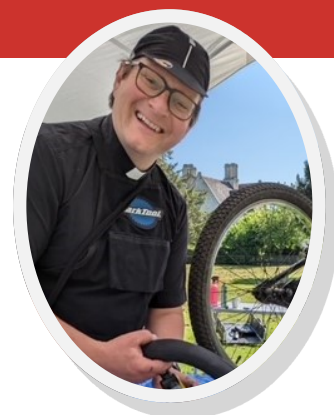
Out and about with Revd. Mark



Like any occupation, it is an agreeable, helpful and healthy thing to meet my peers from time to time. I have been meeting the ministers from Methodist and Grace Churches along with representatives from Sportily, the Christian sports mentoring charity who work in Quedgeley and Hardwicke for the last few years.

Recently I have been also meeting a pastor from One Church who lives in Quedgeley. We pray together, learn from each other and encourage each other. We come from different backgrounds and expressions of church and we disagree on many things but we are agreed to disagree well because we recognise in each other our deep faith in Jesus.

Working together we hope to bring 'Open the Book', which is a simple re-enacting of bible stories in a non-evangelising way into schools which do not yet have it. Most recently we have created a sign for the Town Council notice boards with simple information about the worship in the three churches and contact information with links to our websites. It is a great joy to work and pray together in the light of Christ.

What I am praying about

There are times when prayer does not come easily and sometimes I am asked how to pray at those times. I pass on the good counsel that I received at those times and that is to use one of two prayers, whichever feels right. One is called the Jesus prayer. There are many slight variations but the one I use goes like this:

Jesus Christ, Son of the Living God, have mercy on me, a sinner ... (repeat slowly and with regular breathing until you are ready) ... AMEN

The other is simple a call to Jesus:

Maranatha, come Lord Jesus ... (repeat slowly and with regular breathing until you are ready) ... AMEN

'Maranatha' simply means 'come Lord' in Aramaic, the language of Jesus. Whichever feels right, when I am feeling a little lost I have found it best to keep it simple. It's like saying SOS or mayday when we are lost at sea - a simple, to the point cry for help. Give these prayers a try!



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A look at the various seasons of the Church Calendar: the month of June brings us to the feast of PENTECOST. By Fr. Ian Robb

On the night before his arrest, Jesus gave the disciples a promise: "I will ask the Father and He will give you another Comforter, the Spirit of Truth..." and on the day we now call Ascension Day he gave them this instruction: "Stay in the city until you are clothed with power from on high..."



During a period of forty days, they had become aware that Jesus was indeed alive, victorious over death, and no longer limited by the human condition. The time had come to return to the Godhead; naturally, they were sad at the thought of life without him and wondered how they could continue his work. "I will not leave you bereft..." was his reassurance; it must have been very difficult for them to wait and see what would happen, while all the time wondering if they too would be arrested.

Fifty days after Passover, on the day of Pentecost (from the Greek word "pentekoste" - fiftieth) when the first corn harvest was being celebrated, the events described by St Luke in the Acts of the Apostles took place. The twelve disciples (Matthias had by this time been elected to their number) and their companions – including Mary the mother of Jesus – were aware of a new awareness within and among them. The fear had gone, the doubts had been lifted, the coldness of bereavement had been replaced by the warmth of life and love. Recounting the events, they struggled to describe them, comparing them to the great natural forces of wind and fire – the basic elements of creation itself.

They knew then that the promise Jesus had given them had come true. He was still among them, but in a new and even more powerful way. They were still in the city, but now the time had come to move on. The ability to "speak in other tongues" was a sign that they were to reach to other peoples and nations and that they were to be channels for God's saving love to flow around the world. They were no longer disciples – people who sat at the Master's feet, learning from him. The Spirit of God had confirmed them in their faith and was preparing them to be Apostles – those who are "sent out" - Greek, apo-stello – to send out – to work for God.

The feast of Pentecost is therefore the birth-day of the Church Universal, when the Spirit of God came to empower that small group to go out and perform the mission entrusted to them by the risen Christ himself. Having been baptised in water, they were now immersed in the Holy Spirit and reborn into a new calling.

The risen Lord is no longer present to the Church in the body of his flesh; the Church is now to be the new body of Christ, filled with his life through the gift of the Spirit. It follows that when we celebrate the feast of Pentecost, we are not just remembering a famous event in the Church's history. The Holy Spirit of God is as active in the Church as he was in the days of those first Christians. Whenever Baptism, Confirmation, and Ordination are celebrated, there the Spirit is at work. Whenever a penitent is forgiven, whenever a sick or dying person is anointed, whenever Christian marriage is celebrated, there the Spirit is at work. And when bread and wine are consecrated by a priest, we may be sure that the spiritual presence of Christ is given to us.

This year, 50 days (Pentecost) after Easter (Passover) falls on 8th June; we hope that you will "stay in the city" - St James Quedgeley – and celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit on each one of us, that we may be given strength for God's service.

Creation Care - spot something remarkable, challenge to you!

One of the challenges in awakening our care for creation is how separate we are from the world around us. It is sometimes moments of joyful reconnection that stir our hearts to care. Earlier this week I was passing a normally very still small pond in our garden when there was a decisive wobble of the surface weeds and I realised that a frog had made a home there. Standing back and watching using my imagination to engage in this creature's beautiful, if sometimes harsh world was just one of those moments of joy for me. Have you spotted something remarkable in the creation around you this week? Have you spotted the red kites that have become familiar about Quedgeley or perhaps a fleeting glimpse of a bat at dusk or a kingfisher on the canal? The Church's Healing Ministry (4)

Prior to his death in April, Fr. Gordon wrote four articles on the healing ministry. In this the final article, Gordon opens up about his own illness and how prayer was such a powerful component in helping him to continue and lead as much of a normal life as he could.



The Church's Healing Ministry is full of hope, it is exciting and we can see its results.

I'd like to conclude this short series with a couple of personal anecdotes or case studies, if you like.

The first comes from my time as Curate. It involved a senior member of the Church there - We'll call him Michael for simplicities sake. Michael was a very fit and active man in his late seventies, a leading man in the congregation. He toiled constantly in the Lord's service.

One day he told us that he had undertaken some tests at the hospital and had been diagnosed with an aggressive Leukaemia and the medics had given him six months to live. As you can imagine, it was devastating news.

We prayed for him and laid hands on him and one Sunday evening a few weeks later, we held our periodic Healing Service. Michael came forward to the communion rail to receive prayer and hands were laid on him. He told us he was going to the hospital the following morning for further tests and a 'progress' report.

The following evening Michael rang me to tell me that his tests had all proved to be negative and that the doctors could find no trace of the Leukaemia in his body. It was a Miraculous Healing.

The last I heard is that Michael, now in his nineties, is fit and continuing his work for the Lord.

The second comes from closer to home. In August 2015 after a biopsy, a lump in my neck was diagnosed as being malignant. It was a secondary cancer, but the prime site couldn't be found. The tumour was surgically removed and following a six week course of radiotherapy I was pronounced clear of cancer, with a less than 2% chance of the secondary returning.

By the summer of 2019, a series of tests, scans and a biopsy revealed that the tumour had, indeed, returned and into my back. I undertook another course of radiotherapy.

In February 2020 my consultant told us that medically I couldn't be 'cured' but my condition could be 'managed'. Since that time I have endeavoured to carry on as normally as possible.

After a couple of years I was curious as to 'how long I had got' so I euphemistically asked my consultant 'When these tumours return are they usually aggressive?' 'Oh, yes,' he replied 'very, but yours seems to be indolent! (Sounds like one of my old school reports!) 'I have no medical explanation for this – it can only be prayer ...'

Well there's certainly been a lot of prayer. Gratefully, I seem to have been on the receiving end of the whole range of the Church's healing ministry – Prayer both public, in services and in private, hands have been laid on me, I have been anointed regularly and have received a huge amount of pastoral care from both Ordained and lay members of the congregation at St James.

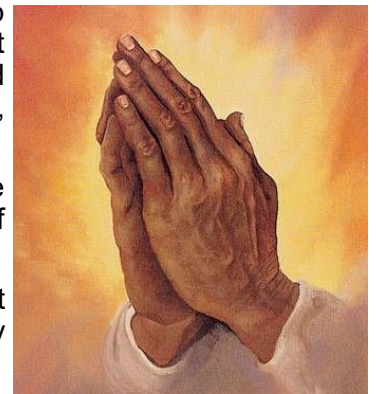
This is not to forget a huge input from those who serve as professionals in the Health Service. I must have been ministered to by up to fifty medical professionals over the last five years, without exception they have been kind, patient and always appeared to have my best interests at heart.

I have felt totally at peace throughout the whole process. I have been blessed by meeting so many kind and caring people. In a sense, it appears that my illness has been part of my life's blessing.

All this goes alongside the unstinting full time carer at home who promised, over fifty years ago 'in sickness and in health' I'm sure she never appreciated the full implication of what that meant to her. Another blessing.

I hope that you have enjoyed reading this short series about the Healing Ministry and have found it helpful.

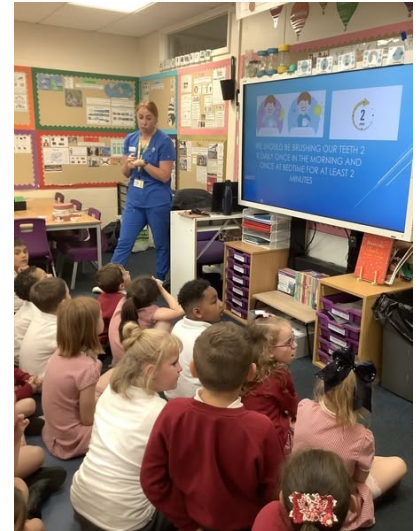
Theresa from Tesco's!

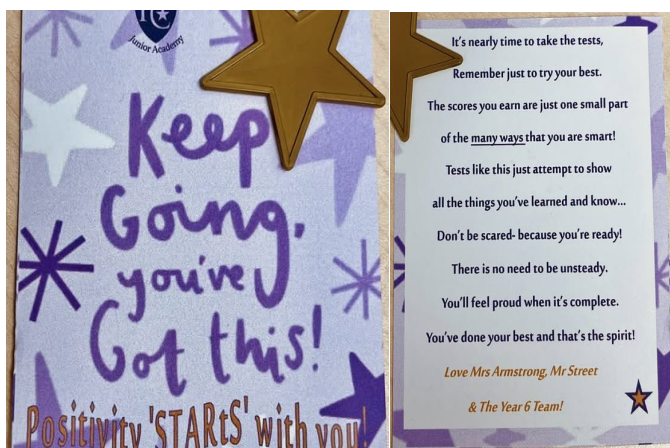

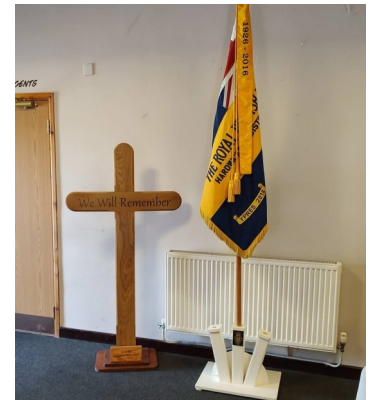

Following on from this, we are moving towards our Annual Council Meeting where a new Chair and Vice Chair will be elected for the year and all the existing councillors will chose their committees for the year. We are excited to say that we have 2 new councillors starting in May so that will mean we will only have 2 vacancies on the council. If by reading this you are curious of the role of being a Town Councillor then now really is the time to join.

Annual Meeting

By the time you read this we shall have held the Annual Parish Assembly. This year it is on the same night as the Annual Council Meeting and which is scheduled to start beforehand. This is a chance for local residents to come along and meet the councillors in a relaxed and informal manner.

Events: We have decided this year not to hold our Annual Dog Show which was scheduled for Sunday 8th June 2025. The councillors felt that their attention needs to

focus at the moment on more pressing matters, such as an increasing amount of vandalism and anti social behaviour around Quedgeley and Kingsway and therefore their efforts are going towards meeting with the relevant authorities with a view to tackling and overcoming this problem as soon as possible. Joined up meetings with neighbouring councils are also taking place with regards to the current infrastructure and the impact of new developments on our roads. We therefore apologise for any inconvenience caused this year but we are confident we will be back next year bigger and better and feel that sometimes other matters are just more important.



Cllr Nick Lee laid the wreath on behalf of the Council at the VE Day service at St James' War Memorial on 8th May 2025. It was lovely to see so many people there, including all the children from the local schools.

The Annual Accounts have now been audited by the Independent Auditor and are due to be sent to the External Auditor on the 20th May 2025. There were no exceptions found by the auditor and the Public Rights Notice will commence on Monday 2nd June 2025 providing local residents an opportunity to come and view the accounts at a time agreed.



As we have briefly mentioned, we are currently experiencing hugh amounts of vandalism and anti social behaviour which is not only mindless but is costly to you the tax payer. Our message to our residents is that if you see anything that you feel is not acceptable, please call the Police so that they are aware of the situation, rather than reporting it to the council retrospectively. We are trying hard to deal with this problem but as you can imagine it is a never ending problem.

We are excited to announce that additional play equipment is due to be installed at Druids Oak Playpark following feedback from the community. This is work in progress so look out for some positive changes and thank you to everyone who contacted this council with so many ideas to consider.



We are also reviewing Bristol Road Rec with monies put aside to improve this facility too. The Town Council's Future Group meets regularly to discuss council aspirations and identify projects that can take place to benefit the community and it's a very satisfying feeling when projects are fulfilled.

All of the above is hard work and various projects are split amongst councillors and committees. If this is something that might interest you, we still have some vacancies on the council. If you are concerned about how much time you need to commit, then please feel free to come along to the meetings to observe first.
