### Out and About with Revd. Mark

#### - a logo for St James



Some may say 'what is in a logo' and of course we should never judge a book by its cover. On the other hand we do like to head out to Tesco reasonably presentably and we communicate a lot by the expression on our faces - the first thing we present to the world.

Some logos mean little and say little but I believe that the church of St James has a lot to say. When we worked hard to reflect on what we have to say in response to a parish that has doubled in size and is home to around 15000 people living in young family units we said 'God loves Quedgeley. Let's live God's love together'. We felt that three colours defined the church, Red for love, Gold for God and Green for Creation. The question is how we can say that in an image that we can use as a shop front as connections in this community grow and more and more folk come to explore faith at St James.



I asked team StJs who meet every Sunday at 11.30am to come up with some ideas for a logo and we looked at loads of examples from different churches. The different ideas we came up with are on a board at the back of church and in the picture here. I have been visiting that board and praying over the last month asking for inspiration from the Holy Spirit and so finally when I sat down to bring all the creativity in these images together the new logo was ready. We are trying it out over coming months. I think it says so much about why St James is learning and growing in

Christ and is becoming a home for so many more who want to do just that as we <u>live</u> **God's love together** with presence and purpose. I hope you like it.





#### **Common Sense - by Andrew Wakely**

We are all different; that's how God made us; so it's hardly a surprise that we often have different ideas which, thank goodness in our democracy, we can express. If we are wise, we listen with respect, even when we don't agree, and through discussion, we may even modify our own views and become all the better for it. What follows therefore isn't right or wrong, it's just my view.

We have recently read a series of articles on the use of our senses in prayer. This included things like listening to bird song or music, touching rosary beads, looking at pictures of icons, smelling fabulous scents from flowers and so on. For me, they seem to distract.

Hearing bird song in the morning can be a great joy and stimulate thanksgiving and worship, but it doesn't help me pray, so I should like to suggest another sense. Common sense.

I have a simple brain and need to keep things simple. So let's consider language to start with. Use English; if you are Spanish, then use that, of maybe Swahili if you come from East Africa. So for me, out go the old medieval words like doth and dost, because I live in 2025!!

It should perhaps be said that Thee and Thine etc can be very valuable in recognising Gods almighty Kingship, and help in offering the full honour and glory he deserves, but that's as far as it goes for me. God understands all the languages of the world so it's not a problem for him, indeed he even has his own that he will offer as a gift and aid to prayer if you want it.

Use a template if that helps. The old much quoted acronym ACTS: Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving and Supplication (asking) works well; the Lords' Prayer contains all these elements but in a slightly different order.

Finally, if we are asking for help or guidance, we need to listen for a reply. I have found that when I allow a time for God to reply during prayer, the answer never seems to come, or at least not right then. However, I notice that the more listening time I allow during my prayers, the more he gives answers, but at other times; not just when being quiet or walking or in thought, but also while driving, shopping and so on.

Finally, whatever you do, keep talking to Him; that's how we build relationships.

Does that seem like common sense to you?

## "Times and Seasons" - the Christian Year

A look at the various seasons of the Church Calendar: in the month of November, as we journey from All Saints Day to Advent

None of us are Christians in isolation: "In my Baptism I was made a member of Christ, a child of God, and an inheritor of the Kingdom of Heaven" (The Catechism, Book of Common Payer). We are members of a company of saints and our belonging to that company transcends death.

All Saints Day and the commemoration of the faithful departed on All Souls Day both celebrate this mutual belonging. All Saints Day celebrates men and women in whose lives the Church as a whole has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. "All Saints" is an opportunity to give thanks for that grace and for the ways in which it shapes human lives. It is a time to be encouraged by the example of the saints and to recall that holiness can grow in the ordinary circumstances, as well as the extraordinary crises, of human living. The Commemoration of All Souls celebrates the saints in a more local and intimate key. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more closely – those who gave us life, those who nurtured us in faith – all of whom now live on closer to God.

Redemption is a work of God's grace; it is God who redeems us in Christ and we cannot do more than Christ has done. But we must wait for the final consummation of God's new creation in Christ; all who belong to Christ, whether or not they have passed through death, are all joined in prayer that God's kingdom will be revealed finally and in all its fullness. We sense that it is a fearful thing yet wonderful and life-giving to come before God and receive his mercy; this instinct also is expressed in the liturgy of All Souls' Day.

**Remembrance Sunday** goes on to explore the theme of memory, on both an individual and a community level, as we confront the issues of war and peace, loss and self-giving, memory and forgetting year.

The annual cycle of the Church's Year ends with the **Feast of Christ the King**. The year that begins with the hope of the coming Messiah ends with the proclamation of his universal sovereignty.

The Ascension of Christ has revealed him to be Lord of earth and heaven, and final judgment is one of his proper kingly purposes. The Feast of Christ the King returns us to the Advent theme of judgement and a new Christian Year begins.



## **Creation Care by Revd. Mark**

Over these last months we have been celebrating the Season of Creation and exploring why we are in a covenant with God and Creation and not a contract. A Covenant is a loving promise. A promise in response to a love and offered in love. A contract is a legal declaration of intent to meet precise, agreed conditions and terms of service. Contracts and covenants are needed in everyday life but they are very different. They come from our nature as creatures. A good example is to work hard for a teacher who we know works hard for us. That hard work doesn't feel forced like it might if we had made a commitment in a contract. Working with and alongside creation in God's love is like a covenant. We care for the soil and the rich soil returns riches many fold. We are drawn to a deeper care, deeper into covenant.



Over harvest we explored these covenants as we made hand pressed apple juice together showing that hard work, faithfulness and love moved us from an empty glass to a glass full of sweet apple juice. Then in October, StJs planned and led an evening 'Hot Chocolate and Bat Watch'. The yew trees - cared for centuries by the people of Quedgeley - make a perfect home for hundreds of bats. What is even better - that care for the yew trees, means that the bats prefer roosting in them to roosting in the church, where they would be in conflict with human beings. The covenant under God with the yew trees in the church yard is returned with a clean church. Love begets love, creation is enriched, life is abundant. This is the covenant between God, Humanity and the rest of Creation.

#### A Taste of Autumn Comfort

As the nights draw in and a chill fills the air, November wraps us in its damp, misty embrace — the perfect excuse to put the kettle on, put your feet up, and enjoy a little comfort.

What could be better than a slice of Tricia Cook's scrumptious **Toffee Apple Cake**? Baked with love for our *Tea* @ 2 crowd, this seasonal favourite disappears almost as quickly as it comes out of the oven! Sweet, sticky, and full of autumn flavour — it's the perfect treat to brighten a grey November afternoon.

#### **Toffee Apple Cake**

Ingredients for 8" square tin

9oz soft light brown sugar

5oz butter

5oz canned caramel

2 beaten eggs

7oz Self Raising flour

1tsp baking powder

3 eating apples—2 peeled, cored and chopped

1 peeled, cored and cut into rings

Preheat the oven to 160C grease and line baking tin

Put sugar, butter and caramel into saucepan and stir until melted

Cool for 10 minutes. Stir in eggs, flour and chopped apple.


Spoon into tin, smooth top and arrange apple rings on top.

Bake approx. 1 hour or until skewer comes out clean.


Cool in tin

### In the garden with Victoria

This month we begin our new gardening column. It's clear that many of you have a garden that you treasure. Victoria Miller, local councillor, regular at Tea@2 and a keen gardener, shares with us jobs that she's undertaking in her garden during the month of November. There is nothing like the sight of early bulbs to welcome the start of Spring and give the garden the first flash of colour. It is now the time to plan and plant the bulbs that will provide that fresh burst of colour. Whether you plant them in pots or in beds the general rule is you need to plant them at least double their size, if you plant up pots you can crowd them more and even have layers of different types of bulbs.

November heralds colder mornings and the first frosts of the year. There are several plants that continue to give a most beautiful display until these frosts come. In my garden it is the dahlias that have the spotlight at the moment. Though many people think that they are too much work I just love their variety and colour. After the first frosts it is time to lift the dahlia tubers. Carefully cleaning them off you need to store them in dry compost in a cool frost-proof place. I find leaving them for a short while, upside down inside, will help to dry out the soil and make cleaning them up easier. There are some people who take a risk with their dahlias and leave them in the ground over winter. This is risky and the success can depend on several factors – the severity of our winter, how well you protect them and what type of soil you have, well drained or clay. To protect dahlias left in the ground you need to cover them with at least 15cm of mulch. One positive about leaving them in is that they sometimes have a 'head start' over the ones you have brought in, but on the other hand you must make sure that you protect the tiny new shoots from slugs and snails. One last word on dahlias – if you do lift them remember to label them – I have made that mistake in the past!

Another November job in the garden is taking care of your roses. It is important that you remove any fallen rose



leaves from the ground around the base of the bush especially if they have black spot as this fungal disease can spread and reinfect the rose via the soil. Though the main prune is done in the spring this is the time to give your roses a 'light prune' to prevent wind damage. Lastly it is a good idea to apply a thick layer of mulch eg well-rotted manure, around the base of the rose. November is a good month to plant bare rooted roses, these tend to be cheaper than potted up ones. If, like me, you have some roses in pots, now is the time to protect them from the coming cold. If you can move them to a more sheltered place, for example by the house, if not you can wrap them up in bubble wrap.

The herbaceous border in my garden tends to start to look rather sad and messy in November, so this is the time that you can get out and have a bit of tidy up – putting the garden to bed for the winter as it were. Though there are a lot of perennials that you should think about cutting back there are some like salvias and penstemon that need to wait until spring. I say 'bit of a tidy up' as a messy garden provides food, shelter and hibernation sites for all sorts of wildlife and there is a school of thought that says that the big 'tidy up' should wait for spring.
