The Roastery at the Orchard retail park is one of the first places I got to know in Quedgeley four years ago when I visited, to meet the Ministry Team. As well as great coffee and tea they have a range of savoury light bites and patisseries. They are very dog friendly and so Emily and I headed over there during half term after a walk along the canal with Biddy.

I enjoyed a flat white and we both loved our English breakfast, which was competitively priced for a freshly cooked breakfast using bacon and sausages from local butchers. The atmosphere is warm and inviting. It can be quite loud, which is something to consider if you are hard of hearing, but it really feels very lively and sociable.

When we are looking for something quieter we eat outside. There are dog biscuits and water and I always leave with a large bag of coffee grounds, which are great for compost. If you are looking for somewhere to go over the next weeks or somewhere to take guests, Emily and I can recommend the Roastery.

Times and Seasons The Christian Year Fr. Ian Robb

A look at the various seasons of the Church Calendar: in the months of December & January we journey through Advent to Christmas, and Epiphany

Advent is the season of expectation and preparation as the Church prepares to celebrate the coming (Adventus) of the Christ – God-made-man – the Incarnation - and also looks ahead to his final advent as Judge at the end of time. The readings which we shall hear and the words we shall share in our worship will direct us towards Christ's birth and also challenge us to confront the theme of divine judgement.

The Four Last Things – Death, Judgement, Heaven, Hell – have throughout Church history been themes for Advent meditation, giving us twin themes of expectation and penitence. The material world tempts us to rush on to Christmas, making it hard to maintain the sense of watching and waiting, but the basic Advent prayer remains "Maranatha – Come, Lord Jesus".

Church decorations are basic – no flowers, and purple is the colour of the season. For us, Advent falls at the darkest time of the year and the symbols of darkness and light have a powerful part in our observation, underlined by the lighting of the candles of the Advent ring. The third Sunday of Advent provides a brief splash of colour as we celebrate the work of John the Baptist on "Gaudete" (Rejoice!) Sunday. The last days of Advent are marked at Evening Prayer by a series of Antiphons, the "Great O's" of Advent which inspired, for example, the hymn "O come, O come, Emmanuel".

Christmas - it's much more than the birth of Jesus. The task of all the worship during this season is to recall us, amid all the joyful customs and celebrations, to the central truth of the Christian faith that God became Man in the person of Jesus the Christ, the Messiah, who was born of the Virgin Mary. St John describes this wonderful event: "The Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory." This miracle of God intervening in our humanity is called The Incarnation – a mysterious and dramatic event which was first centred on the birth of Jesus in the 3rd century.

Francis of Assisi devised the tableau which we now know as the Christmas Crib, and which was the inspiration for the original Nativity Play, Christmas carols are a medieval tradition, which was developed and expanded in the 19th century, and which blossomed into the service of Nine Lessons and Carols in the early 20 th century.

Strictly speaking, the Christmas season lasts for forty days, ending with the Presentation of Christ in the Temple on 2nd February. This is traditionally the time for celebration a time which has now been moved, by the secular world, to the weeks before Christmas. The Church, in her wisdom, keeps our attention focussed with the feasts of St Stephen the first Martyr (26th Dec), St John the Evangelist (27th Dec), the Holy Innocents (28th Dec), and the Naming of Jesus (1st Jan), thus leading us to the Feast of:



 $\label{eq:continuous_problem} \textbf{The Epiphany} - \text{or "Manifestation"}, \text{ or "Showing Forth"}, \text{ of the Christ.}$

Each of the four Gospel-writers has his own version of "Epiphany", with Matthew's account being closest to the infancy of Jesus, and is the one which is included in our carol-singing and nativity plays – despite the fact that much time had probably elapsed between the birth of Jesus and the arrival of the Magi – the "Wise Men from the east". These scholars represent the Gentile world, which the Christ has come to rescue from sin.

As the weeks of Epiphany unfold, we shall hear St Mark describing the Baptism of Jesus, when the voice of God the Father declares him to be the Son in whom He is well-pleased. St John will take us to a wedding-fast at Cana, where Jesus performed his first miracle, thus revealing his true self to his first disciples. The season ends as we remember Jesus, at forty days old, being presented to God in the temple in Jerusalem, and we hear the aged Simeon declare him to be "a light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of God's people Israel". But the Redemption he will bring must be won through suffering – so the Incarnation is directed to the Passion; and Simeon's final words move our attention from the celebration of Christmas towards the events of Holy Week and Easter.

Take, for example, this very publication. Back in 2015, a small group of us recognised a need — a need for people of like mind and faith to respond to our community's challenges in the best way possible within our own walks of life.

So that's it for now — but I do hope this reflection has made you think a little! The subject of **Endeavour** is really important for us as our lives as Christians develop.

So here's a question for you, dear Reader —

Do you make the endeavour in your life to be a disciple of Jesus?

This will be the subject we'll explore further in next month's Editorial!



Our **Next Steps** project is moving ahead quickly. There's a lot of preparation underway, and plenty of paperwork to complete before restoration can officially begin. In this final update of the year, **Andrew Wakely** explains where we've reached so far and what comes next!

This is the last update of the year and progress is still being made. Sadly you don't get to see much of it as for the main part is involves paperwork, planning, meetings, grant applications and important documentation. This will continue in the new year.

On the progress front we now have the important Statements of Need and of Significance completed and have been fortunate to be able to compare ours with those of another Church who made a successful application on a similar project. Ours are now being proof read and will then be submitted to the DAC for an informal first submission to ensure we are on the right lines.

The project is generating much interest and we have now been visited by separate groups of historian enthusiasts with another in the pipeline.



Encouraging news on the grant funding has been the successful application of yet another Church who have been successful in gaining funding for their re-ordering from by the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the very organisation with whom we are having opening discussions.

Finally, as an interim measure, you will have noticed that much of the carpet has been removed to expose the lovely Victorian tiles below. The good news is that although their condition looked dire in places, it is nowhere near as poor as we thought. They are in fair condition for their age and it looks like they can be lifted without too much damage. It is still work in progress, they have been cleaned by the first level of specialist chemical cleaners, and the next soon we hope.

Patience is the name of the game. They have been hidden for many years so it is worth doing the job carefully and properly. The tiles are part of the precious heritage of which we are temporary custodians, and which we want to retain as we build for the future as God plans.

What I am praying about....

Expectant, sometimes impatient, waiting, characterises this time of year in the lead up to Christmas. Afterwards many experience something of a post Christmas, New Year low. But what are we waiting for and is there something in what we are waiting for that will bring salvation from a post Christmas low so that we can begin 2026 in hope?

Beyond our immediate waiting for Christmas 2025, this year I am waiting for the coming of a new kindness. Salvation from the many things today that feel like they are going wrong. For all of the alienation of our politics and attitudes, I believe that the story of Jesus shows us that kindness - becoming 'kin' to others and treating others as 'kin' - is the outlook that will bring hope and keep us going well beyond Christmas and into the New Year.

At Christmas, the Creator becomes 'kin'. The Creator becomes created, fully human, so that we might know His powerful life-renewing love for us. That really is something that can give us hope in 2026 and forevermore.

ANN'S EASY CHRISTMAS CAKE

1 1/2 lb. Mixed dried Fruit*

3/4 lb. Brown Sugar*

9 oz. Butter*

1/4 lb. Ground Almonds

1 tsp Mixed Spice

1 1/2 cups Water

4 Eggs

12 oz. Plain Flour

3/4 tsp Bicarbonate of soda* Rum etc.

Ingredients marked* boil in pan for 15 minutes. Cool. Stir in Flour,

Almonds, Spice, eggs and rum. Place in an 8 inch round cake tin that has been lined.

Bake for approximately 3 hours at 120/140 electric.



Festive Cheese Scone recipe

Our Tea@2 crowd love these scones. Great with a morning or afternoon cuppa with lashings of butter.

250grm Self raising flour

Pinch of salt

60grm butter

125grm cheddar cheese (mature)

1 large egg

150ml milk



- Line a baking tray with parchment and turn oven to 200c degrees (FAN) or Gas mark 7
- 2. Place flour and butter in a bowl. Rub in butter until mixture resembles bread crumbs
- 3. Add mustard and salt
- 4. Add cheese and mix in egg and milk
- 5. Turn out on floured board and using a pastry cutter cut into shapes.
- 6. Place scones in oven for around 15minutes until light brown and firm to touch.

In the garden with Victoria

Our second article, written by Victoria Miller, takes a look at garden jobs for December and January. Victoria explores the controversial question of whether you should rake the leaves off your lawn or leave them where they fall! Do you have a strong opinion or some useful advice to share? I think I will start this month's 'To Do' list with something that can be a little controversial – to rake or not to rake? A couple of weeks ago in a Sunday paper I read an article stating that we should NOT rake up leaves. It went on to state that by leaving fallen leaves we are providing nutrients to the soil, creating habitats for wildlife, providing food for birds and helping animal hibernation. Not to mention saving time and reducing waste. I was surprised as the raking of leaving is one of the big jobs in my garden at this time of the year and I can hear my Father's voice saying that 'leaving leaves on the lawn will lead to moss'! A warning to all in search of the dream of a 'perfect' lawn! To explore further I did a bit of research.

The Gardeners World and RHS websites agree with my Father – one states the reason is a healthy lawn, the other the getting rid of possible hiding places for slugs. So, I guess it all depends on how environmentally friendly you want to be as to whether the raking of lawns will be on your 'To Do List'.

December is a good time to hard prune overgrown shrubs and hedges while they are dormant and also fruit tree – though not those growing against a wall which are primarily summer pruned to restrict vigour and encourage fruit bud formation.

The mulching of shrubs that started in November can continue into December if not already done. It is also a good time to think about protecting any pots that you have.

It is not just the pots themselves that need protecting from cracking but the plants inside those roots are more exposed to the cold winter frosts than if they were in the earth. If possible it would be good if you can move the pots under cover or nearer the house so they get some protection from frost. Sometimes due to size this is just not possible. If you like me have such large/ heavy containers then the best way to protect them and the plants inside is to wrap them up - bubble wrap or garden fleece can be used. Remember to put a layer of mulch on top too.

December and January are good times to do general maintenance around the garden. Jobs like clearing out the garden shed, organising your tools, and sharpening any that need it as well as cleaning the green house and sorting out all your plastic pots! Making sure that your outside taps are insulated is another important job to do as well as cleaning your bird feeders - if you have them. It is still important to ensure that the birds have access to water over winter so on very cold mornings it is a good idea to make sure their water has not frozen over. Keeping any pond you might have from freezing over is also a job that needs an eye kept on it. A solid ice barrier stops vital oxygen from entering the water and prevents toxic gases from escaping. These gases would harm any pondlife that you may have.

If you want to bring a bit of colour to your garden you can pot up a container or two. There are lots of plants that can survive the cold months for example Pansies, Violas, hardy Cyclamen, Hellebores and Ivy to name a few.

Una Steer a member of our congregation tells us about the highlight of her day when she met H.R.H The Princess of Wales at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire.




We finish on **December 17th** and start again in the new year on **January 7th** every Wednesday at **11oclock**.




