In Lent, and beyond: Fast from criticism; feast on praise. Fast from self-pity; feast on joy. Fast from bitterness; feast on forgiveness. Fast from idle gossip; feast on purposeful silence. Fast from jealousy; feast on love. Fast from discouragement; feast on hope. Fast from complaining; feast on appreciation. Fast from selfishness; feast on service. Fast from fear; feast on faith. Fast from anger; feast on patience. Fast from concern; feast on compassion from others. Fast from discontent; feast on gratitude. Fast from pessimism; feast on optimism.

2025 - the Year of Faith: "We believe..."

Two of the greatest problems faced by the early Christians were those of communication and travel. For the most part, news was spread by word of mouth or by letter, and the slowness of travel – either by land or sea – meant that news travelled very slowly. In the beginning Christian groups were small in number and often isolated from each other; it was easy for misunderstandings to develop. The world outside the Church was still a powerful influence – and often opposed to the "New Way": the Greeks and Romans worshipped many gods, and often the Roman emperor claimed to be divine and "knowledge" itself was the subject of worship.

In 325AD a gathering of bishops and other clergy from Europe, Palestine, and North Africa was summoned. Representatives from Britain were also there. They met in Nicea (North-west Turkey) with the aim of unifying the Church and clarifying what Christians believed, in the hope that leaders and teachers delivered a clear, error-free, message. The meeting lasted for three months and the final statement, which was proclaimed by Emperor Constantine became to profession of faith which we use in church every Sunday: the Nicene Creed.

"We believe..." - this is our faith – and it begins with a bold statement: "We believe in one God, the Father Almighty...". In contrast to the pagan world, we believe in only one God, the source of all that exists – things we can see and things we cannot see. Those first Christians also believed that God is revealed to us in three specific ways: God the Father / Creator of all; God the Son, Jesus Christ, who shared our human life and experience for a time; and God the Holy Spirit, who guides, inspires, and strengthens us day by day. This threefold vision of God we call the Holy Trinity – Three in One.

Jesus himself encouraged his followers to call God "Father", to acknowledge him as the source of all being, and to enter into a relationship of love with him. For the act of Creation is an act of love, not necessity, and it shows God's desire to share his love and goodness with us.

All this was very challenging in a world of many gods which were often seen as vengeful, judgemental, menacing, and unloving. Our Creed begins by reassuring us of God's total, unfailing, love for us. He made us; he encourages us to share in the beauty, wonder, and love of creation around us. He gives us the ability to love and care for one another; and that ability to love also makes us aware that there is around us something quite the opposite: a force for evil and harm which God calls us to struggle against. Through the life and ministry of Jesus, God proved it is possible

to overcome this force of evil and work for love and goodness.

During this first week of Lent, as we look at the opening statements of the Nicene Creed, we pause to meditate on God as Father, Creator, and Sustainer of all life.

Here are two questions to consider this week:

How does belief in God as Father shape your own trust in him?

What can you do to align your life more closely with God's will as your Creator and Sustainer?
